

6th Marines Conduct Car Safety Check

Some 400 members of the 6th Marines can look forward to driving home for the holidays in cars known to be safe -thanks to a regiment-wide policy of providing free safety inspections on privately-owned vehi-

The inspection—which generally requires less than 10 minutes—is performed by 6th Marines' motor transport personnel, operating for the convenience of Marines attached to each battation.

Each automobile is systematically checked to assure its owner a maximum chance of successfully and safely making his way home and back through holiday-packed highways. Among items inspected are lights, brakes, tires, windshield wipers, turn indicators, exhaust, crackfree windshields and windows.

Owners of cars failing to pass the inspection were urged by their commanding officers to have their cars attended and returned before attempting to drive home through heavy traffic.

Capt. A. J. Spence, Motor Transport Officer of the 6th Marines, said that for the most part, the inspection results were "pretty good."

"Not too many of our Marines' cars failed the inspection," he said; control. "and most of those which didn't pass failed for minor reasons."
