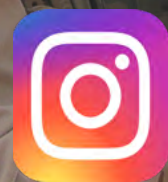

Regiment celebrated 120 service to the Nation!



February 2nd, 2021, marked the 120th year of service to the Nation. Since its establishment, the unit has been known by many names: At the time of establishment, the 11th Cavalry Regiment; the trio of the 11th Tank Battalion, the 11th Cavalry Group (Mechanized), and the 712th Tank Battalion during World War 2; the 11th Constabulary Regiment, while patrolling Germany after the war; and the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment, from when it served in Europe, Vietnam, Kuwait, Afghanistan, and the National Training Center.

We are credited with participation in eight campaigns: peacekeeping in the Philippine Islands during the Philippine-American War, chasing Pancho Villa in Mexico during the Mexican Punitive Expedition, fighting across Europe in World War 2,

opposing the Viet Cong in Vietnam during the Vietnam War, supporting humanitarian efforts in Turkey and Kuwait in Southwest Asia, and conducting operations in Iraq and Afghanistan as part of Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom. Throughout our history, we have maintained a reputation of being highly mobile, highly trained, and devastatingly lethal.

The 11th ACR Celebrates Black History Month with Barstow Mayor February 12th, 2021

Dr. Paul Anthony Courtney, Mayor of the city of Barstow, was the guest speaker at the Regimental Support Squadron's Black History Month Celebration at the Sandy Basin Community Center, Fort Irwin, Calif. on February 12th. Dr. Courtney's speech, "If It Does Not Challenge You, It Will Not Change You," discussed greatness being about inspiring someone else and the importance of treating others with respect, kindness, and compassion. Dr. Courtney is the first African-American to hold the position in the city of Barstow. Heritage month celebrations are established by Congress to recognize the contributions of all Americans to American culture and history. African American Heritage Month was enacted by Public Law 99-244 and approved on February 11, 1986.



Blackhorse Power Outage Sports Day February 26th, 2021

Fort Irwin's first planned semi-annual power outage of the year took place on February 26th. To provide alternate activities for Soldiers and Family that decided to stay on post, the Regiment organized a sports day. 1st Squadron operated Softball and Ultimate Frisbee, 2nd Squadron handled Soccer and Backyard Games, and Regimental Support Squadron managed Basketball, Power Ball Toss, and provided Horse Detachment for a petting zoo. Several food trucks were present for patrons to replenish their energy.





Blackhorse Triathalon

April 3rd, 2021

The first Blackhorse Sprint Triathlon occurred on April 3rd. Over 50 group and individual participants signed up. The event began at 8:00 a.m. with a 200 meter swim at Oasis Park, then a 20 kilometer bike route and a 5 kilometer run route, both starting and ending at Constitution Park. The fastest three finishers all completed the course within 62 minutes, with the fastest surpassing the second by nearly 10 minutes. Plaques celebrating their achievements were given to the top three male and female finishers in each age bracket and the group participants.

May 8th, 2021

The Boy Scouts of America Pack 67, Troop 67 Boys, and Troop 67 Girls conducted various activities throughout the year. The scouts worked with Horse Detachment to earn the Horsemanship Merit Badge on May 8th. Andrew Furtick fund-raised and led an Eagle Scout project to beautify Wickam Park, finishing on June 8th. On July 31st, the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment supported a Merit Badge Workshop at Fort Irwin Middle School. The 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment, along with the 916th Support Brigade and the Make-A-Wish Foundation, was pleased to welcome 8-year-old Carson Gardner to Fort Irwin on May 24, to fulfill his wish to be a U.S. Army Soldier for a day. The day started by meeting with Brig. Gen. Curtis Taylor, who 'commissioned' him. 2nd Lt. Gardner rapidly moved up the ranks as the day progressed through visiting Horse Detachment, riding in tactical and armored vehicles, and viewing and participating in weapons systems drills and simulations. Col. Gardner closed out the day after meeting with Col. Hook.

The stations consisted of traditional Cavalry tasks and Expert Infantryman Badge/Expert Soldier Badge tasks including call for fire, weapons lanes, react to contact, vehicle identification, obstacle reconnaissance, medical evacuation, unit history, and more.

After becoming a General officer, he went to the National Training Center where, under his command, the training scenario began including counterinsurgency operations in urban terrain.

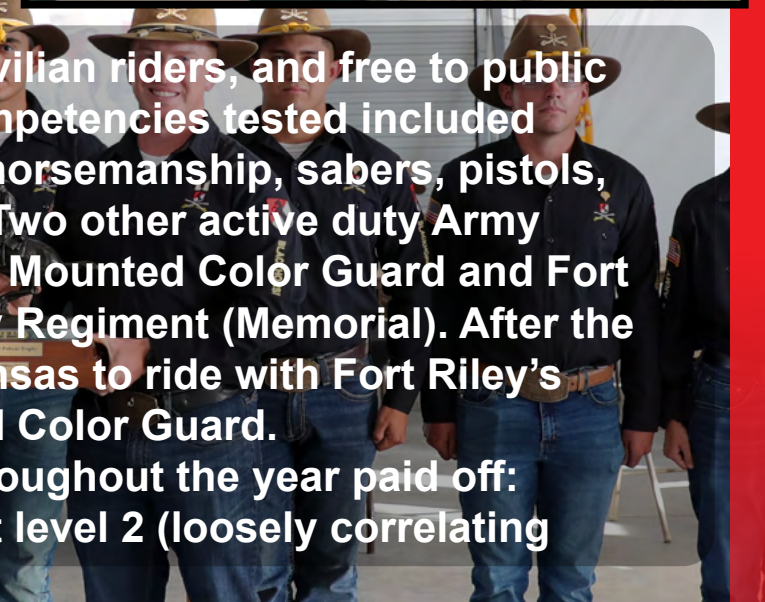

Horse Detachment brings home the National Cavalry Competition Trophy September 21st-25th, 2021

Nine riders and their horses from Horse Detachment represented the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment at the Annual Bivouac and National Cavalry Competition, held by the U.S. Cavalry Association from September 21st to 25th at Historic Fort Reno, El Reno, Oklahoma. The competition was open to both military and civilian riders, and free to public spectators. The U.S. Cavalry competencies tested included military horsemanship, combat horsemanship, sabers, pistols, jumping, and endurance riding. Two other active duty Army units participated: Fort Carson's Mounted Color Guard and Fort Huachuca's B Troop, 4th Cavalry Regiment (Memorial). After the event, the team continued to Kansas to ride with Fort Riley's Commanding General's Mounted Color Guard.

Horse Detachment's practice throughout the year paid off: one Trooper was named the best level 2 (loosely correlating to 'advanced') rider of the competition, and the detachment was awarded the General Casimir Pulaski Trophy, given to the "most outstanding military unit", for the 3rd time in a row. Every rider placed in the top 3 of at least one event and many placed in as many as three.





11th ACR hosts the Blackhorse Marathon September 25th, 2021

The Blackhorse Marathon, first held in Fulda, Germany, in 1977, returned this year on September 25th! Runners had a choice of the full 26.2 mile marathon route, a half marathon of 13.1 miles, or the option to take on the route with 4 other teammates.

The marathon was sponsored by the Blackhorse Association and held in remembrance of Maj. Gen. Robert J. Sunell. Col. Sunell was promoted to Brig. Gen while commanding the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment (48th Colonel of the Regiment) at the Fulda Gap from 1978 to 1980. From there, he commanded the Army Training Support Center in Fort Eustis, VA, until 1983; served as the project manager of the M1 Abrams Tank until 1986; then was the Director of the Armored Family of Vehicles Task Force until 1987. His peers have referred to him as the “father of the modern tank”.



58th Combat Engineer Company conducts Live Demolition Range October 13th, 2021

On October 13th, the 58th Combat Engineer Company, 1st Squadron, conducted a live demolition range as part of 22-01 Blackhorse Stakes. 58th Combat Engineers trained on M112 Composition C4 Block Demolition Charges, M1A2 Bangalore Torpedos, 40-pound Composition H6 Cratering Charges, and 40-Pound M3A1 Shaped Demolition Charges. These tools are used to breach and overcome natural and enemy obstacles and fortifications, clear paths through wire and undergrowth obstructions, and assist in creating entrenchments by moving earth and boring holes.





11th ACR executes Live Fire Mortar Range October 13th, 2021

On October 13th, the Mortar Platoons assigned to Headquarters and Headquarters Troop, 1st Squadron, and Headquarters and Headquarters Troop, 2nd Squadron, performed tasks relating to the Mortar Training and Evaluation Program as part of 22-01 Blackhorse Stakes. The M121 120mm Mortars are indirect-fire weapons systems outrange small arms and light weapons carried by infantry. The indirect fire assets have more destructive potential by changing the munitions, which in turn make them more versatile.



1st Squadron Takes Home Commanders Cup Trophy December 2nd, 2021

On December 2nd, the Regiment conducted the Commander's Cup. This event hosted Troopers from each Squadron to compete in a series of sports and events that included: Basketball, Cornhole, Dodgeball, Football, Ultimate Frisbee, Softball, Weightlifting, a 5k Run, Rower event, Ruck, an Obstacle Course, and the Murph challenge.

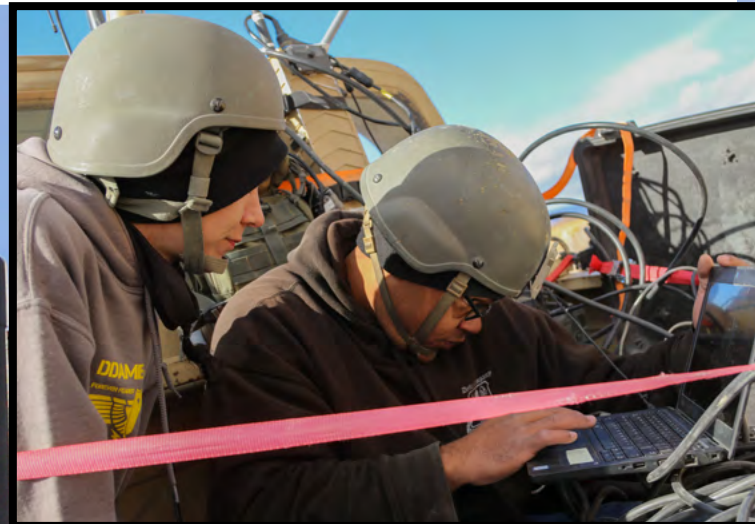

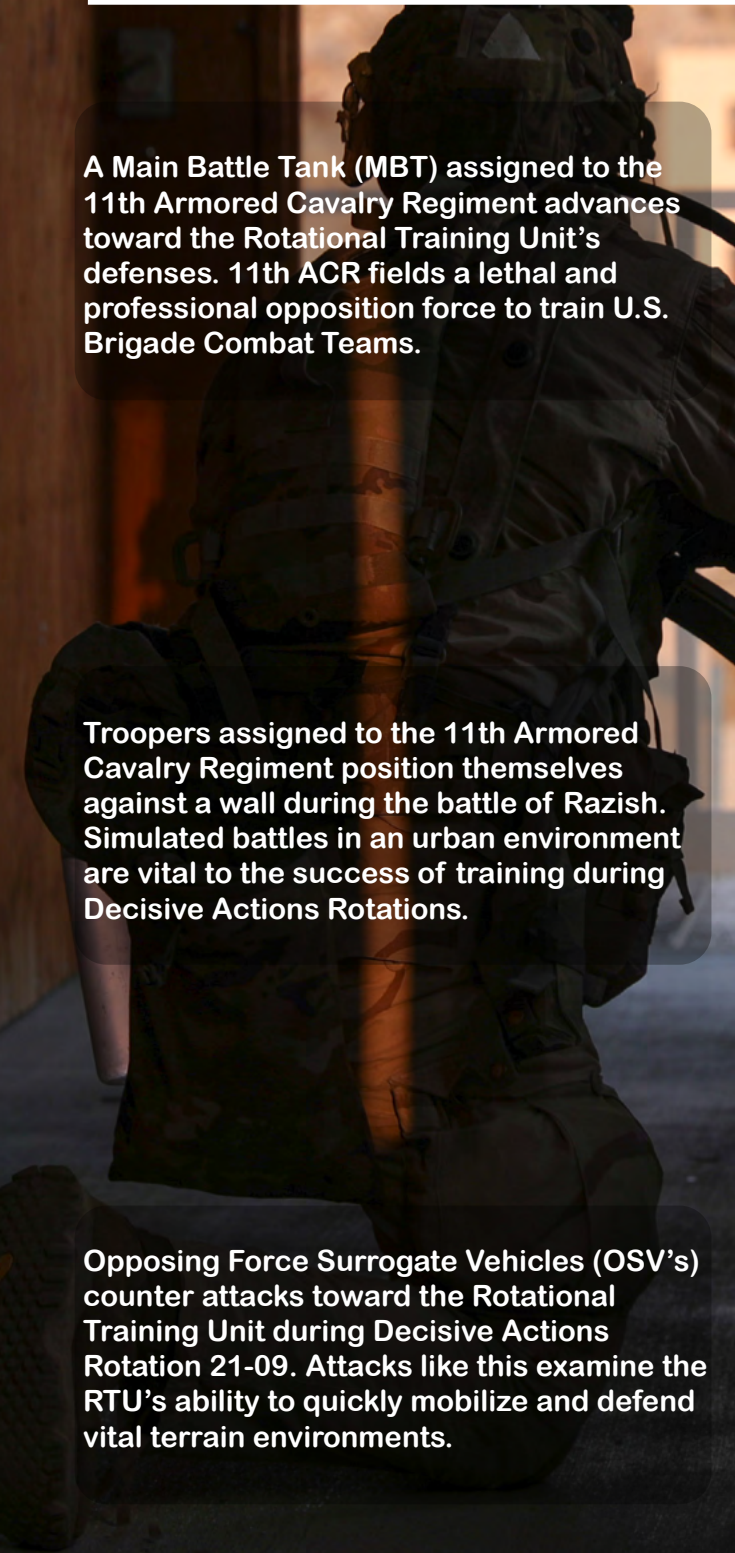
