Stop Loss Special Pay

The Army personnel office has announced that a Retroactive Stop Loss Special Pay is being offered to dispense special pay to Soldiers, veterans, and survivors of Soldiers whose service was involuntarily extended between Sept. 11, 2001 and Sept. 30, 2008. Service members are eligible to receive \$500 for every month or partial month served under stop loss authority. To receive this pay, those who served under stop loss must submit a claim before Oct. 21, 2010. The Army has created an online claim process to apply at https://www. stoplosspay.army.mil.

The Army estimates at least 120,000 Soldiers and veterans qualify for the special pay. Currently, less than 20,000 have applied.

Blackhorse Troopers celebrate fallen comrade's life

Blackhorse Troopers, other Soldiers and friends gathered to remember the life of a fallen Trooper during a memorial ceremony at the Center Chapel on Fort Irwin, Calif., Feb. 12.

The life of 20-year-old Pfc. Michael J. Pana was remembered by his command team and his friends as one of hard work, dedication and foremost, one of joyfulness.

"We're here today to mourn the loss, and celebrate the memory of Pfc. Michael Pana,"

said Capt. Karl Harness, D. Company commander. "Michael was an outstanding Soldier. Since he arrived in Delta Company, he made a positive impact on us all. He served with honor and distinction; always doing the right thing and setting an example for others to follow."

Pfc. Pana, originally from Jackson, Tenn., was assigned to D Company, 1st Squadron, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment, on Feb. 2, 2009. He attended One-Station Unit Training at Fort Knox, Ky., where he graduated as an M1 Armor Crewman in January, 2009. Pfc. Pana passed away in the early morning of Feb. 7, after a vehicle accident on Interstate 15. He

survived by his mother Eliza Dizon, two sisters Ashley and Elizabeth, a brother Marco, and an aunt Emy Montgomery.

His commander and friends remember Pfc. Pana as someone who brightened up everyone's day said Capt. Karl Harness.

"For me, the one thing I remember most about Michael was that smile he always seemed to have on his face," Capt. Harness said. "Whenever you came to talk to Mike, that smile was there, whether it was on duty or off, he had one of the most infectious and positive personalities and always took a lighthearted and fun approach to life."

Security Guard Transition

In accordance with Installation Management Command personnel office, IMCOM must transition its installation access control Contract Security Guard (CSG) force in the United States to a Department of the Army Security Guard (DASG) force in response to Congressional mandates and the anticipated loss of waiver authority in the future. The contract security guard effort was in response to the closing of Department of Defense (DoD) installations following the 9/11 terrorist attacks and non-availability of military personnel to provide access control.

Since the waiver authority has not been extended beyond 2012, IMCOM needs to identify 1735 Contractor Man-year Equivalents (CME) for conversion to DA civilian positions. As a result, IMCOM must gear up an aggressive hiring campaign to meet its FY10 in-sourcing target. Hiring will began in phases at the installations identified at the following link. 



New barracks groundbreaking is today

By Christmas, a new barracks and company operations facility should take its place in the desert landscape, marking an investment of more than \$17 million in quality of life for Soldiers at the National Training Center and Fo t Irwin.

The groundbreaking for the new facilities will be held at 3 p.m. today at the intersection of 9th Street and Barstow Road.

The new facility will include company operations space for two 100-person companies, said Capt. Tiffany M. Maraccini, deputy resident engineer for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers-Los Angeles District.

The unaccompanied enlisted barracks will be a single two-story L-shaped building, which will have an area of 32,000 square feet containing 44 - 1+1E modules for a total of 88 single personnel, Capt. Maracinni said.

"Housing modules will consist of two bedrooms, walk in closets, full kitchen with a dining counter, bathroom and a separate vanity/dressing area." she said.

Common areas will consist of a lobby, chief of quarters (CQ) station, day room, and centralized laundry rooms, she said.

The company operations facility should be completed by November or December of this year and ready for occupancy by Soldiers in early 2011, she said, adding that the unaccompanied enlisted barracks should be completed and ready for occupation by about the same time.

Amenities in the company operations facility include a conference room and eight offices spaces, with a restroom between the two sides, she said. The readiness section will have TA-50 Gear Storage for 100 persons and an arms vault, communications storage, unit storage, a non-security storage, and a mezzanine area that could be used for office, or storage space, she said.

Each barracks room has hard-wired internet and wireless, and a satellite television hookup, she said.

Coalition Forces train fo

The narrow street of the village is bustling with life. Merchants call out to passersby in Pashto as they present their wares from carts under the hot desert sun. Men sit outside their homes and businesses, talking and listening to music as women wearing modest clothing and head scarves make their way toward the market.

There is a rumbling in the distance and soon the people of the village can see the dark shapes of armored vehicles approaching the edge of town. While some decide to go inside, many continue to go about their business. Soon the rumble becomes a roar as three of the heavily armed vehicles began to slowly roll down the street.

There is a massive explosion just to the left of the vehicle. People scream as the gunfire erupts from a rooftop above the village. Troops quickly emerge from the back of the transport with guns drawn. There is a second concussion as an improvised explosive device (or IED) detonates in a nearby car throwing a debris and dirt up into the air.

When the smoke clears, there is a man lying in the street with a large gash on his head. He cries out for help as the troops exchange fire with insurgents hiding in one of the buildings.

Welcome to Medina Wasl, where such chaos is commonplace. What sets this small village apart from others is that it is not located in some exotic part of the world, but in the Mojave Desert of Southern California.

Medina Wasl is one of thirteen mock "villages" located at the National Training Center at Fort Irwin California, a remote military base roughly fifty miles from Barstow. The base uses these faux cities, complete with actors and special effects to create a realistic environment to train and prepare troops for deployment to Iraq and Afghanistan.

Known as "The Box," the NTC has more than 200 foreign speaking employees, as well as actors, makeup artists and special effects experts who, working along with base personnel have created a startlingly realistic portrayal of a war zone thousands of miles away. Using these resources, military commanders are able to craft scenarios (called iterations) to test and train soldiers in a real time three hundred and sixty degree environment.

"What this allows us to do is to make mistakes. You make mistakes in training so you don't make them over there," said Colonel Wayne Eyre, brigade commander, 2 Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group. Currently, the large contingent of Canadian forces is training at the NTC in preparation for deployment to Afghanistan in the Spring. Eyre explained that the re-

sources and environment offer troops a chance to get a taste of what they would see once they are deployed.

"The scenarios are very realistic ... it is as close to reality as we can safely get our Soldiers," Eyre stated.

The realism is the result of several factors. The harsh, rugged terrain and climate is a near perfect match to that of Afghanistan. It is within the more than 1200 square miles of desert that the high intensity scenarios are carried out. The villages themselves are constructed to mirror the style and layout of those in the region as well, featuring mosques, markets, and residential and industrial structures. No detail is overlooked as a walk through any street reveals debris and burnt cars, all placed to create the intense and eerie atmosphere.

While the physical surroundings play a large role, it is those working within them that truly bring the chaos of modern warfare to life. The NTC employs a large number of personnel both civilian and military to bring places like Medina Wasl to life. Afghan nationals, base personnel, and some professional actors play the roles of the villagers, who are sometimes told to act hostile toward troops and form

large, angry mobs during the exercises. United States Soldiers play the roles of the enemy forces and are instructed to "go all out" when battling with troops during the training.

"I usually get up around five in the morning," Said Jessica Urugia who plays one of the villagers in Medina Wasl. "We usually finish up around five or six in the afternoon."

Urugia is part a small group of actors in the Media Wasl who are amputees. According to Urugia, she and the others come into camp extra early and are fitted with prosthetics and makeup. During the battles, they often portray victims of rocket attacks and IEDs who have lost their limbs. Urugia said she is proud of the work she is doing, adding that her husband's deployment overseas encouraged her to help.

"My husband is a military person...I want him to get the best training so he can come home safe."

Johnny Wing, an actor and special effects artist from San Diego wears several hats at Medina Wasl. When he is not using his industry training to help with apply realistic makeup to those playing the wounded, he uses his acting experience to play a Soldier suffering from head trauma during some of the scenarios.

"It's been a good experience working out here with these guys. It's a satisfying job at the end of the day," Wing said. "It feels like we are serving a bigger purpose."

Upon visiting Media Wasl and the NTC, it becomes clear that one of the main goals is to create the most accurate and authentic experience possible. The result is startling and visceral, giving troops a taste of what one Soldier described as "the worst possible day you could have in Afghanistan."

"The realistic effects add to a level of confusion that tests the individual's battle skills," said Mehdi Imtaiz, a captain in the Canadian Forces training at Fort Irwin.

Using real pyrotechnics and real weapons equipped with a special laser system (referred to as MILES, or multiple integrated laser equipment system) troops are thrown into each scenario with a mission to complete and no idea when or where they will face attacks from the opposing forces. The result is a training environment that is unpredict-

able, forcing troops to put their skills, knowledge, and physical and mental strength to the test. It is a challenging situation and everyone involved takes his or her role seriously.

"We might play around before, but once we hit the ground, we are all business," said J.P. Lafrance, a Soldier in C Company of the 1st Battalion of the Royal Canadian Regiment Battle Group. After completing a dismounted patrol scenario in the larger "city" of Medina Jabal, Lafrance explained that he and his peers treat every exercise as a life and death situation, creating an atmosphere that feels disturbingly authentic.

"I spoke with guys who have been deployed," Lafrance said, "and they see this place and are like 'welcome to Afghanistan'."

"I've been through those iterations and they are intense," said one U.S. Soldier who was present at Medina Jabal to observe. "Your heart is pounding even though you know it's not real."

The sights and sounds of war are all present at the NTC, offering those who visit a glimpse of the harsh realities and challenges troops face overseas Medina Wasl, Medina Jabal and the other cities and villages used for training are normally closed to the public. However, Fort Irwin and the U.S. Army do allow non-military persons to sign up for tours during the training cycles, which run for several weeks. 

Ban on USB devices in Army remains

WASHINGTON—The ban on using USB devices on military computers remains, for now, in the Army—despite a partial lift of the original ban by U.S. Strategic Command.

USSTRATCOM issued a tasking order to services and concerned parties, Feb. 12, that allows the services to loosen restrictions on use of USB and flash media devices. Individual services, however, may continue the ban until they feel their networks are adequately equipped to deal with the threats posed by the portable storage devices.

The official word from the Army Global Network Operations Security Center is "we are currently conducting mission analysis in order to provide guidance for the Army's safe return of thumb drives and flash media."

According to the AGNOSC, there are conditions that must be met prior to the lift of the ban. Those conditions include, but are not limited to ensuring that users are only using government-

approved and purchased devices and that Army networks are properly configured.

The U.S. Strategic Command implemented a ban on USB storage devices in November 2008, to include such things as memory sticks, thumb drives, and camera memory cards. That ban was partially lifted by their tasking order

The USSTRATCOM commander has "approved a Communications Tasking Order directing that the limited use of memory sticks, thumb drives, and camera memory cards (commonly called 'flash media,') be restored on Department of Defense computers after the verified implementation of certain procedures and operational practices," according to guidance from the U.S. Strategic Command.

The procedures are meant to ensure that malicious code that can be present on USB memory devices is prevented from infecting DoD computers.

"Until all conditions are met, the ban on the use of removable flash drives will remain," said AGNOSC.

"In keeping with the Hawaiian theme, it only seemed fitting that he played Santa," Capt. Harness said. "As he came out, the astonished children looked at him with curiosity and challenged his really being Santa Claus. But Michael, being true to himself, took this with a grain of salt, and quickly won over the kids through his great personality and again, that infectious smile."

One of his closest friends, Spc. John Howard, said Pfc. Pana's personality influenced everyone around him.

"He lived everyday to the fullest," Spc. Howard said. "No matter what we were doing, whether it was some of the worse details or just sitting around the office, he was always smiling. His positive attitude influenced the people around him."

While assigned to D Co., Pfc. Pana served as a driver and loader for an M1A1 tank crew. During rotations at the National Training Center, Pfc. Pana served as an Iraqi Police Officer and as an Iraqi National Army Soldier. Pfc. Pana's awards consist of the Army Commendation Medal, Army Achievement Medal (one Oak Leaf cluster), National Defense Service Medal, Global

War on Terrorism Medal and Army Service Ribbon.

"He was commended for his outstanding replication of local national security forces, his steadfast dedication to his work undoubtedly helped save the lives of us servicemen and civilians," Capt. Harness said.

"He went from being a battle buddy to someone who I consider, to this day, Family," said Pfc. Emery Gettis, Ir.

At the end of the ceremony, the Soldiers paid their final respects to Pfc. Pana by saluting his picture at the front of the chapel. Some took longer to compose themselves while they said goodbye to their brother. While his Soldiers grieved the loss of their brother, Capt. Harness told them a few words of encouragement.

WCAP Soldiers shine at U.S. Biathlon World Team Trials

COLERAINE, Minn.—U.S. Army World Class Athlete Program biathletes 1st Lt. Jennifer Wygant and Sgt. Jesse Downs had impressive performances at the U.S. Biathlon World Team Trials on Dec. 12-13 at Mount Itasca.

Wygant won the women's 7.5-kilometer sprint race on Saturday with a time of 23 minutes, 44.2 seconds. Along the way, she missed only two of 10 shots on the firing range, making her one of the top two shooters of the day.

Wygant was followed by Susan Dunklee (24:00.8) of Baton, Vt.; Laura Spector (24:15.1) of Lennox, Maine; and Tracy Colliander (25:02.9) of Durango, Colo.

Downs finished fourth in the men's 15-kilometer mass start competition on Sunday with a time of 41 minutes, 23.6 seconds. Zach Hall of Anchorage, Alaska won the event in 40:14.3, and was followed by Walt Shepard (40:16.9) of Yarmouth, Maine; and Dan Campbell (41:10.6) of Bozeman, Mont.

Both Soldiers are bidding to make the IBU Cup Team to compete with U.S. Olympic Biathlon Team contenders on the World Cup circuit and continue their quest to make Team USA for the XXI Olympic Winter Games, scheduled for February 12-28 in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada.

The Olympic biathlon and bobsled events will be contested in the nearby resort town of Whistler. The biathlon is a combination of cross-country skiing and rifle shooting, from both the prone and standing positions. It was -2 degrees at race time Sunday—without the wind-chill factor.

Downs placed eighth in the men's 10-kilometer sprint race Saturday with a time of 27:39.4. Mark Johnson of Mount Itasca won the event in 26:20.6.

Wygant finished 10th in the women's 12.5-kilometer mass start event Sunday with a time of 45:31. Colliander won the race in 40:56.9.


