

Operation Liberator II begins *Massive nationwide search continues*

Efforts to recover isolated, missing, detained and captured personnel across Iraq, are being launched through Operation Liberator II, April 15.

The Joint Inter-Agency Personnel Recovery Working Group, which is made up of all United States Forces-Iraq units, U.S. Embassy-Baghdad agencies and both U.S. and Iraqi law enforcement agencies, will be initiating the operation.

nationwide," said Lt. Col. Marvin Chavous, the United States Division-North personnel recovery officer for Operation Liberator II and Task Force Marne. "U.S. forces have established a nationwide campaign through radio and television ads to get the word out to the Iraqi population that they would like to return these missing Americans back home to their families." When local citizens see these ads, they have the opportunity to respond through tip- lines that will be established throughout the country.

The numbers have been published at the national level so that anyone in any region can call a local number, said Lt. Col. Chavous. There's also an initiative

COB Speicher implements plastic recycling program

Corporal Eric Gillson, of St. Paul, Minn., is always making coffee for personnel at the Task Force Marne headquarters. The 3rd ID chaplain's assistant is happy to provide something for his fellow Soldiers.

The one thing that was upsetting him though, was that he had to throw all of the plastic water bottles, he used to make the coffee, into the garbage can.

"I feel like it was very wasteful throwing all of those bottles away," he added. "Throwing those bottles away hurts the environment."

Apparently, others on Contingency Operating Base Speicher agreed and are helping Soldiers on the base to recycle so now Cpl.

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to establish a nationwide phone number that feeds into Baghdad that people can call into as well, he added. The regional and nationwide tip-lines provide continuity as some units move out of the country while others move in.

When the new units arrive, the established phone numbers and tip-lines will assist the process of finding the missing individuals.

The tip-lines will be manned by both English and Arabic speakers, ensuring that all voices are heard and all leads are answered.

Once a lead comes in, the Joint Personnel Recovery Division, at USF-I Headquarters-Baghdad, researches and investigates it to determine the validity of the information.

To ensure maximum distribution of the phone numbers, the personnel recovery team used a variety of methods to publicize it. One of the ways the personnel recovery division circulates the information is by communicating with the Iraqi populace and security forces through key leader engagements and handing out pamphlets during missions.

One of the division's goals is to encourage the Iraqi people to disseminate the information to their family and friends, that way anyone with information about the missing individuals has the opportunity to come forward. Personnel recovery division members hope Iraqi citizens will assist in finding the missing individuals.

There are currently 16 cases of missing individuals in Iraq; one of those individuals is listed in the United States Division-North area.

"They're citizens that were here supporting operations for their country and supporting fellow Soldiers, and some were here conducting business on behalf of American government as contractors," said Lt. Col. Chavous. "Regardless of the reason they were here, it's important that we help to bring them home to close that final chapter with their Families as U.S. forces start to drawdown and bring closure to the mission here."

During Operation Liberator I, the remains of the last missing-in-action servicemember of Operation Desert Storm, Capt. Michael Scott Speicher, were found June 20, 2009. Information gathered from these same methods, led to his recovery.

As a result of Operation Liberator I, initiated May 20, 2009, Operation Desert Storm became the first war in U.S. history without any MIAs.

During Operation Liberator II, personnel will continue to gather information for other cases in hopes of achieving positive results.

1/14 Cav delivers unexpected surprise

Tibij Iraqi Police and U.S. Troop C, 1/14 Cav. visited students at two schools bearing gifts of school supplies in Diyala province, April 7; the Andleab school, in the Albulatif village, and the Abn Baitars school, in

the Jamaylia village. School faculty had no

prior knowledge, nor the purpose, of the visit. "It's an unexpected surprise," said Vice Principal Raad Mahmouad of Abn Baitars. "Anything that will help us is very much appreciated."

This is the second time Abn Baitars have received donations.

The schools run two sessions to accommodate a vast number of students. Andleab have more than 160 children in attendance between the ages of five and 12. Abn Baitars is a secondary school with approximately 220 in attendance between the ages 13 and 18.

Each school received approximately \$1,000 in school supplies. The faculty chose one class to receive the first of the supplies.

The Tabij IP handed each child in the classroom a calculator, ruler, pencil, and notebook. "The children are happy. That is what's important," said Mahmouad.

The schools were also given things such as white boards, markers, highlighters, and pens. These will be used and distributed throughout the school at the faculty's discretion.

"When we establish this repertoire, the people are more willing to assist us in helping them," said Spc. Mikal Rogers, a Soldier with Troop C, 1/14 Cav. "Not only will this help the kids of Iraq, it will help the country as a whole. We're here to help the future of Iraq. These kids are a part of that future."

Tibij IP and Troop C, 1/14 Cav. have conducted humanitarian missions like these only a handful of times. They hope to continue conducting missions like these in the near future in an effort to establish a relationship with the people of the region.

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Gillson does not have to throw plastic water bottles into a garbage can but in a recycling bin.

Until recently, when those bottles were empty, they were thrown away and burned along with the rest of the trash on the base. Captain Calvin Fisher, of Durham, N.C., and the Iraqi- Based Industrial Zone- Tikrit officer in charge is spearheading an effort to have these bottles recycled.

"This is going to benefit the COB because it tremendously reduces disposable waste we have in our landfills," he said.

A company through I-BIZ, Al-Shefar, was contracted to collect all plastic and aluminum cans on the base. The recycled goods will go to an Iraqi smelting plant where it will be used to create goods including plastic furniture. Large blue bins scattered all over the base will hold plastic bottles and then shipped to Al-Shefar for recycling.

The program also is taking effect in the Speicher dining facilities. For those who eat in the dining facilities, leftover food must be separated from plastic before disposal.

Corporal Gillson is happy to be putting the bottles in a recycling bin instead of the trash.

"I feel good about this," he said. "I enjoy being outdoors and in nature and something like this will definitely help preserve nature."

Captain Fisher felt the program has been a success. "The program's gone tre-

mendously well," he said.

Captain Fisher added more units are requesting receptacles for recycling to take part in the program.



Buried hiker calls 911 from beneath snow

BELLEVUE, Wash. - A hiker rescued following a Washington state avalanche said he was able to phone for help from beneath the snow.

Ian Rogers said he spent about four hours trapped beneath snow April 10 after an avalanche near Snoqualmie Pass on Granite Mountain. He was able to help rescuers determine his location by calling 911, KIRO-TV, Seattle, reported April 12.

"I was extremely lucky," Rogers told CBS's "The Early Show" in an interview from his room at Overlake Hospital in Bellevue, Wash.

"My legs were completely cramped, but I had a little ... space. It was about a foot wide."

King County sheriff's deputies said they used the location of the tower that picked up Rogers' call and information the hiker gave 911 dispatchers to find his location.

Tax filing information

The tax filing season is over for most, but deployed servicemembers are entitled to an automatic extension of 180 days after redeployment, in order to file federal taxes. Here are some other things to consider if you have not filed yet:

FACT: If you plan to use the extension and are on Active Duty, there is no need to notify the IRS that you are deployed – they are track you.

If you are a National Guard/ Reservist called on active duty you do not need to submit anything to the IRS. However, you may consider the following to ensure the IRS is tracking your deployment:

a. Contact the IRS directly by emailing: **combatzone@irs.gov**

b. Mark Your Return. When filing your return, write "Combat Zone" in red at the top of the form along with the date of deployment.

FACT: The IRS, and Militaryonsesource offer "freefile" programs for most service members.

Be careful, other websites may claim free preparation, but then charge to file.
