Three West Virginia Air National Guardsmen promoted to colonel

The 167th Airlift Wing hosted three ceremonies to recognize one current and two former unit members upon their promotion to the rank of colonel.

Brigadier General David Cochran, West Virginia National Guard Assistant Adjutant General-Air, was the presiding official for all three ceremonies.

On Jan. 6, Col. James Freid-Studlo, director of operations for the West Virginia Air National Guard, was recognized for his promotion. Freid-Studlo previously served as a pilot, director of inspections and as the operations support squadron commander for the 167th before taking on his current role at the West Virginia Air National Guard headquarters.

"Only the finest of officers attain the rank of colonel," Cochran said during the ceremony, adding, "We have a great example of a citizen Airman here."

A promotion ceremony for Col. Christopher Croson, director of personnel and manpower for the West Virginia Air National Guard, was held Jan. 7. Croson also served at the 167th prior to moving into his headquarters role. After enlisting into the 167th Logistics Readiness Squadron, Croson commissioned and went on to serve as the 167th Maintenance Squadron commander and the deputy commander of the 167th Maintenance Group before stepping up to the state headquarters position.

During Croson's promotion ceremony, Cochran said he expects Croson to take on more

responsibility within the WVANG and beyond the A1 directorate.

"He's going to continue to take care of Airman and make sure we're doing things the right way within our organization," Cochran said.

Col. Corey Gause was also recognized for his promotion on Jan. 7. Gause is the commander of the 167th Mission Support Group, a role he took on in September. His previous assignments include deputy United States Property and Fiscal Officer- Air and director of Plans and Programs for the West Virginia Air National Guard.

During the ceremony Cochran thanked Gause for accepting the challenge of commanding the mission support group.

"The mission support group touches every aspect of this base," Cochran said. "It takes a whole team of support to keep this operation moving. We know you're up for the challenge."

167th Operations Group pilot completes Weapons Instructor Course

A pilot with the 167th Airlift Wing, Martinsburg, West Virginia, recently completed the intensive Weapons Instructor Course at the U.S. Air Force Weapons School, Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada.

U.S. Air Force Maj. Kyle Wagner, a pilot assigned to the 167th Operations Group, is the first wing member to apply for and complete the WIC, which trains students in air, space and cyber weapons superiority. Wagner's training consisted of six months of time constrained mission planning, flying and analysis.

"It was more intense than what I was expecting," explained Wagner. "There are too many tasks to complete, briefings to prepare or missions to plan for and not enough time. This is intentional, and the purpose is to make you comfortable operating in a stressful environment."

The final phase of the course is comprised of group training with students from each of the major weapons systems at the USAFWS. The purpose of this combined training is to integrate with other weapons systems during mission planning and execution to learn their capabilities.

"The main benefit to the base as a whole is having a tactics integration expert with close ties to multiple intelligence and tactics personnel across the Air Force and, in some cases, outside the Air Force," explained Lt. Col. Randall Wright, 167th Air-lift Squadron Commander. "These ties, along with an enlisted and pilot Air National Guard background, will likely provide effective, efficient and focused training and exercises geared toward the latest Air Force tactics, techniques and procedures."

In order to be selected for the course, pilots must be among the top instructor pilots in their squadrons, be qualified and proficient at performing airdrops, and be recommended to attend by their wing commander. Wagner competed with other qualified C-17 Globemaster III aircraft pilots from across the Air Force for a spot in the class, which had a maximum capacity of six members. He eventually secured his spot in the class with three other pilots.

"Our squadron has never had a C-17 Weapons Officer," said Wagner. "I wanted to attend the course not only to fulfill that role, but also to be able to teach and train our crews in honing their tactical knowledge and flying skills."

Wagner stated that he plans to use his experience to help mentor other 167th pilots and loadmasters, and help them prepare for future conflicts. Part of his job as a WO is to help prepare others to take on the same training he did and to eventually replace him as a WO, he stated.

"Maj. Wagner's drive and professionalism as an aviator and officer made him a top choice for this demanding course," said Wright. "I am very proud of his willingness and extraordinary performance in completing the course. Maj. Wagner was awarded the C-17 Academic Award and the C-17 Outstanding Graduate Award."



Antiterrorism & Force Protection - Suspicious Packages

These tips addresssuspicious packages/mail.

Delivering an explosive or incendiary devise through the mail is an anonymous and relatively risk-free way for a terrorist to hit a target. Fortunately, we can counteract this threat by identifying suspicious packages or envelopes and then safely dealing with them. What makes a package suspicious?

- An unusual or unknown point of origin.
- No return address.
- Return address doesn't match postmark.
- Incorrect spelling on package label.
- An excessive amount of postage.
- An abnormal or unusual size.
- An uneven balance or shape.
- Oily stains on the package.
- Wires or strings protruding from the package.
- Peculiar odor.

Of course any of these identifiers could just mean a relative, friend, or fellow Air Force member didn't do a good job of packaging a gift or part, but just the same you should be a little extra cautious. Usually after further investigation and examination of the exterior of the package or envelope there is enough evidence to indicate a package is safe to open. However, if you are still not certain of a package's safety after an examination of it, don't open it. Notify the Security Forces Desk at 5300. They will advise you on what to do and notify the personnel who need to deal with the situation.

If you think something is suspicious, then it is suspicious!




Step 1: Put a plan together by discussing the questions below with your family, friends or household to start your emergency plan.

- What is my family/household communication plan?
- Do I need to update my emergency preparedness kit?

Step 3: Create a Family Emergency Plan


- Find out what disasters are most likely to happen in your area and the history of their occurrence.
- Stay informed of any specific instructions or information you may need to know regarding these specific disasters.
- Create a comprehensive plan as a family for communicating if you are separated during an emergency.
- As a family, discuss where you will go in the event of an emergency.



Step 4: Practice your plan with your family/household

- Set up practice evacuations or shelter-in-place drills at least twice a year for your family to ensure everyone knows what to do and where to go in the event of an emergency.
- Update your plan according to any issues that arise.
- Keep your emergency kit up to date, replacing water and perishables periodically. Make sure everyone knows where it is and to take it when sheltering or evacuating.
- Check your smoke alarms regularly.

Combating Trafficking in Persons Program Management Office U.S. Department of Defense

What is Trafficking in Persons (TIP)?

The **use of force, fraud, or coercion** to compel a person to provide labor, services, or commercial sex. Any minor (under 18 years of age) involved in commercial sex is a victim of human trafficking (no force, fraud or coercion need be proved). TIP is the recruiting, harboring, transporting, providing, or obtaining a person for the purpose of exploitation. In sex trafficking, it also includes soliciting and patronizing.

Common Types of TIP: Labor Trafficking, Sex Trafficking, Child Soldiering, Domestic Servitude, Debt Bondage/Peonage, Involuntary Servitude

Who is at risk?

Victims can be of any:

- Race
- Gender
- Nationality
- Social status
- Economic status
- Immigration status

Vulnerable populations:

- Undocumented migrants
- Runaway and homeless youth
- Women and children with limited resources
- Oppressed social or cultural groups
- People displaced by natural disaster or civil conflict
- Victims of prior sexual or physical abuse

What are some indicators of TIP?*

Physical/Environmental indicators. Victims may:

- Have signs of physical abuse (bruises, cuts, burns, broken bones)
- Not possess identification papers
- Live at or be confined to their worksite
- Be escorted or closely monitored at all times
- Be in debt bondage to employer
- Suffer medical conditions such as serious communicable diseases, injuries from violence or hazardous work conditions, malnutrition, dehydration

Psychological/Behavioral indicators. Victims may be:

- Fearful
- Submissive
- Anxious
- Nervous
- Depressed
- Dependent on others
- Emotionally abused
- Lacking ability to move freely

*Indicators listed are not absolute signs of TIP, but when presenting with several are a sign of TIP.

How to respond if TIP is suspected:

If you suspect a TIP situation, do not get directly involved. **Report the situation to the appropriate authority immediately:**
