## **Backflow Training!**

The week of May 15th, civilians and military members of PWD Rota, as well as contractor personnel, participated on the Backflow Prevention Assembly Tester Training and Certification. This five-day course was provided by Mr. Garrett Burnett and Mr. Marco Flammia from Naples, and focuses upon guidelines and acceptable practices for testing and annual inspection of backflow prevention assemblies used in cross-connection control programs. Throughout the week-long course, the attendees were trained on three different types of backflow preventer assemblies, testing on differential pressure gauges, as well as the 80-question written test for those who choose to participate in the voluntary certification program sponsored by the University of Florida TREEO Center. UTCN Aidan Doyle told me that he really enjoyed the class, because it focused on the areas in which he specialized in as the utilitiesman-rated Seabee. Following personnel passed the course and certified: UT2 (SCW) Dodanin Argumedo, UT3 Andriana Vander-Brink, UT3 Kaden Johnson-Powers, UTCN Aidan Doyle, Ismael Bernal Exposito, Oscar Bernal Exposito, and Juan Marquez Bernal.




## SKM Training

He says he was inspired to earn his college degree because he'd be the first in his family to both join the miliary and earn a college degree, making his family name of Argumedo proud!

He also was motivated to show his child, his beatiful daugther Sophia, that "you can do anything you want as long as you set your mind to it." Throughout his time in the military, he was constantly balancing his life, constantly traveling around, working hard, and making time for hobbies (like working out and dancing), all while still managing to complete the degree and becoming a new husband and father is crazy for him to believe. He would've never ever dreamt of achieving all of these accomplishments.





Since 1977, the month of May has been designated to recognize the achievements and contributions to the American military story by Asian Americans Native Hawaiian & Pacific Islanders (AANHPIs). We celebrate the cultural traditions, ancestry, native languages, and unique experiences represented among more than 56 ethnic groups (speaking over 100 languages) from Asia and Pacific Islands who live in the United States and currently serving the armed forces.

Why May? The month of May denotes several events in AANHPI history, including the immigration of the first Japanese people to the United States on May 7th, 1843 and the finalization of the transcontinental railroad, which was predominantly accomplished by Chinese immigrants, on May 10th, 1869.

Generations of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders have a long legacy of service in the US Navy, dating back to 19th century. AANHPI service members have continued to leverage their skills, talents, perspectives, and ideas on behalf of the mission. Personally, I am glad to see more and more Asian Americans being shown on spotlight via films and literature in the recent decades, such as Crazy Rich Asians, Everything Everywhere All At Once, the Farewell, Shang-Chi, Minari, and Parasite just to name a few. Some of these depict struggles through identity crisis, cultural and ethnic clashes, and generational trauma in a way that any third-cultural kid like myself could relate. The pressure of keeping up with sometimes-contradicting cultures and ways-of-life, is real, but all of these experiences has helped shaped me who I am. And I am happy to be my unique self as a Korean American Naval Officer, representing the United

States, serving here in Spain (crazy isn't it?)

Personally, I wouldn't even be here typing/editing this newsletter if not for the Seabees that landed at the shores of Inchon on the morning of September 15th, 1950, during the height of the Korean War. These Seabees were the first to land upon the shores, hurriedly laying down a 400-foot pontoon pier and causeway, making way for the Marine Landing Force to assault the North Korean forces and eventually recapturing Seoul (where I was born 39 years later).



**Susan Ahn Cuddy** (above right), was the first ever Asian American Naval Officer in the history, serving as a first female gunnery officer and then for the U.S. Naval Intelligence Office. She is pictured with her siblings, who also joined the US armed forces.



**Gordon Pai'ea Chung-Hoon** (above), commander of USS *Sigsbee* during World War II, received the Navy Cross for his actions during during a April 14th, 1945 kamikaze attack. USS *Chung-Hoon* is named in his honor.

Harry B. Haris Jr. (below) was the first American of Japanese descent to lead US Pacific Command and was the highestranking American of Japanese descent in the US Navy during his time as commander of USIN-DOPACOM.

CMDCM(SW/AW) Josephine Tauoa (below) made history on February 26th, 2020 when she became the first Samoan Command Master Chief of USS Chung-Hoon.







**Telesforo Trinidad** (above), as fireman second class, is the only Filipino in the US Navy to be awarded with the medal of honor for his heroic actions on January 21st, 1915 during the Spanish-American War aboard USS San Diego, rescuing two shipmates after a boiler explosion.

**Connie Mariano** (left) is not only the first Filipino-American to become a Rear Admiral in the US Navy, she was the first female director of the White House Medical Unit, as well as the first military woman to be appointed as the White House Physician.



Ming E. Chang (above) became the first naturalized Asian Pacific American naval officer to reach flag rank when he was promoted to rear admiral in 1980. He is the recipient of the Legion of Merit (Combat V) and Bronze Start (Combat V) medals.

Rear Admiral Darius Banaji (below), a Civil Engineer Corps Officer, was promoted to the rank of rear admiral lower half on October 2016. Recently, he served as the Deputy Director for Operations for Defense Prisoner of War/Missing in Action Accounting Agency.





Sunita Lyn "Suni" Williams (above), was an American astronaut and US Navy officer of Indian-Slovenian descent when she broke records for total spacewalks by a woman (seven) and most spacewalk time for a woman (50 hours, 40 minutes).
