



PWD Rota Seabees Partake in NAVSTA Rota Flag-Raising Ceremony

At most of the US military bases around the world, the United States flag is raised daily during "colors". The only exception is the Rota Naval Base in Spain, a Spanish base in which the United States Armed Forces are the guests. The Spanish Flag Law establishes in its Article 3.3: "The flag of Spain will be the only one that flies on the pole of public military buildings and in barracks, ships aircraft and any other establishments of the Armed Forces and State Security Forces." Same is written on the Agreement between the Kingdom of Spain and the United States of America on Defense Cooperation Article 16.

However, every year, as a courtesy gesture, the Spanish commander of the Rota Base issues an annual permit to raise the US flag, once a year, during the week which Fourth of July (the US Independence Day) falls on. During the flag-raising ceremony, usually on or before the Independence Day, PWD Rota has been

providing a utility bucket truck from its Utilities and Energy Management Branch, allowing NAVSTA Rota's Public Affairs Officer or its Mass Communication Specialist to be elevated up above in order to take photos of the ceremony. This year's ceremony was taken by MC2 Drace Wilson. After the NAVSTA Rota group photo, PWD Rota Seabees and Khakis also took a photo as well, with LCDR Christina Milone front and center.










A Farewell to Christine Wallace

Milestone Complete: P-712 Substation Migration

The substation migration itself was a huge undertaking, as it required complete base-wide outage on June 3rd, 2023 in order to ensure safe transition of the electrical load. With the installation of the new substation, both the Facilities Engineering & Acquisition Division (FEAD) and the Utilities & Energy Management (UEM) Branch of PWD Rota hope to reliable power source to continuously support missions aboard NAVSTA Rota. One of the military construction (MILCON) projects aboard NAVSTA Rota, N62470-16-C-6001 (P-712 Ship Berthing Power Upgrades) just hit a major milestone in June 2023, during which the transition of the main 66,000-5,500V/50 Hertz electrical substation was switched-over to the new substation. This project, which also includes upgrading of motor and diesel-powered generators to be fully integrated with static frequency converters, and replacement of 5MVA frequency converters, switchgears, transformers and feeders, was initiated in 2015 in order to support the future naval ship loads at Pier 1. As of today, the project is on-track to be finished on the Spring of 2024.









CDR Dunaway's latest PWONOTE discusses expectations in regards to the PWD Rota Military Personnel Employment Guidance







The following message is brought to you by the NAVSTA Rota Public Works Department, Environmental Division.

Please do not feed the homeless, feral cats wandering Naval Station Rota. On the surface, this may seem like a harmless or even humane practice, but it really isn't. Feeding feral cats contributes to increases in cat population. Too many feral cats can lead to starvation, disease, and pre-mature death, under inhumane conditions. Increased population increases kill-off of birds and other wildlife populations, including the protected chameleon. More feral-cats equals an increase in the threat of





disease transmission across both the feral and domestic cat populations. For all of these reasons, any feeding of feral cats is strictly forbidden; to do so is a violation of official CNIC policy.

Your Public Works Department is working with the local governments and the Spanish Navy to humanely control the population in a way that is consistent with Spanish and EU law. This means that under the supervision of a veterinarian, we capture, sterilize, vaccinate, care for, and release the cats back to their home with the goal of improving the health of the existing population, preventing growth in that population in the short-term and decreasing the population in the long-term.
