FROM THE 124TH FIGHTER WING DEPUTY COMMANDER

COL. RYAN RICHARDSON

Some of you may be wondering why it's my picture and signature appearing in this commander's message, so please let me explain. Our Wing Commander, Colonel Chad Kornberg, strongly believes a Drill Status Guardsman can and should lead in this wing. He is now putting those words into action as he steps back into the role of a DSG and returns to his civilian career. Colonel Elizabeth Sumner, who has served as the 124th Fighter Wing Deputy Commander, is preparing for retirement (we will miss her tremendously), and I am stepping into the position as the full-time Fighter Wing Deputy Commander. In that role, I will do my best to carry forward and support Colonel Kornberg's intent for the Wing.



As a leadership team looking back at this summer, we couldn't be prouder. In June, we launched six A-10s and sent more than 100 Airmen to Germany in support of Air Defender 2023, the largest collective defense exercise since the inception of NATO in 1949. We showcased our interoperability and reinforced our commitment to our partners across the globe. At the same time, we were also planning Gowen Thunder 2023 to say thank you to the community and showcase the Idaho National Guard. Gowen Thunder was a wonderful event, and your efforts made it look seamless as we hosted more than 120,000 people on Gowen Field during the two-day event. Thank you for your professionalism and hard work. Although these accomplishments are deserving of a pause, there won't be much time for one.

Colonel Kornberg's Commander's intent letter is available to everyone in the Annual Training Plan. Staying relevant now and ready for tomorrow, with the tools you have today, is the focus for FY24. Mission focus is the priority for the wing. With this in mind, the Unit Training Assemblies for next year will shift to a 0-2-4 schedule. Last year, we received a lot of feedback about drills being spent mainly for administrative work and not your actual AFSC skills. The concept of this new drill schedule is that your two-day drills will be more focused on administrative requirements while the four-day drills will largely be mission focused. Then, you will have a month off with no drill.

We want you to have dedicated time for focused and realistic training. We must be honest with ourselves and ask the tough questions: Are we training realistically? If we were called to fight tomorrow, would we be ready? We need to train in a safe manner and in accordance with rules and regulations. But, to progress along the training continuum, we must push ourselves out of our comfort zone and empower decisions to be made at the lowest appropriate levels. This will include training Multi-Capable Airmen who are prepared for Agile Combat Employment to increase survivability, while generating combat power.



Next year will be filled with deployments for various units across the wing and rigorous certification exercises. Those onstation may feel the reduction in customer service capabilities at home because of it. Communication and detailed planning will be critical to our success

These near targets don't even touch on the recent announcement that the U.S. Air Force has identified the 124th Fighter Wing to potentially receive the F-16 as its future mission. Although steps will be taken to further assess this proposal, we don't want the announcement to be a distraction. We need you focused on what's before us.

The nearest tasks on the horizon will make us collectively mission focused this coming year, but we continue to maintain our three priorities: Mission, People, Future. The Mission is the "why" we do things, the People "how," and the Future is the result of those other two pieces together.

Each shop looks different, and your emphasis on one of these pillars will depend on what the members within your area and your specific unit are facing. You have commander's intent, know what needs to be accomplished, and are empowered to execute the mission. This empowerment will be the hallmark of our collective success.

We have no doubt in this wing's ability to rise to the challenge before us. The task may seem daunting, especially if you measure it in the number of drills we have before we get in the thick of it, but we are up to the task!

Please know that the boss is proud of you, and I'm proud of you. We believe in this wing's ability and agility to meet our nation's call and can't wait to see the great things you will do.

ASOS TRAINING:

BECOMING BETTER COMBATANTS

Special warfare tactical air control party Airmen with the 124th Fighter Wing's Air Support Operations Squadron conducted combat proficiency training May 8-12 at Saylor Creek Air Force Range.

TACP members coordinate air support to defend allied forces. The next step in a TACP member's training is becoming joint terminal air controller certified. JTAC training focuses on proficiency with a diverse collection of weapons systems, vehicles and battle tactics.

This training was about that, says Capt. Luke Nelson, a TACP with the 124th ASOS, focusing on combative maneuvers in an effort to improve individual member's battlefield effectiveness.

"The fight doesn't stop when the planes go away," said Nelson. "When the jets are in the area, we're talking to them. When they're not, we cannot be deadweight. Anything we can do to improve lethality within any particular function of a unit is a win for everybody."





ASOS members conducted weapons familiarization training with the M240B Machine Gun and the MK19 Grenade Machine Gun. Once familiar, they focused on battlefield maneuverability, maintenance and recovery with a variety of vehicles from Storm Search and Rescue Tactical vehicles to MRZR light tactical vehicles and motorcycles.

"Typically, we're not deploying as a whole squadron of operators," said Master Sqt. Justin Clark, a JTAC program coordinator assigned to the 124th ASOS. "More likely, we're getting sent individually or in pairs to support another ground combatant force. Maintaining proficiency in all things combat-related allows us to fully support our host units."

As the U.S. Air Force emphasizes multicapable Airmen, degrading combat effectiveness isn't an option, says Tech. Sqt. Matt Phillips, the exercise coordinator and TACP assigned to the 124th ASOS.

"Our job is inherently multi-capable," said Phillips. "When the aircraft are down for maintenance, we have to be ready for combat. With this familiarization training, we're enabling our members to be 100 percent a weapons system while they're down range."





Between Idaho's varied terrain and its world-class military training ranges. exercising units are able to maintain proficiency and emulate combat scenarios in a multitude of environments.

"Being in Idaho allows us to train in every environment," said Nelson. "We can train in high desert and in the mountains, in every element. Whether we're in deep snow or in the desert, our training will allow us to be sustainable, long term."

With members operating around the globe, staying ready and proficient is paramount, says Phillips.

"We shouldn't wait to train for anything," said Phillips. "We don't train for the next war with the people we think we'll have. We train for it with the people we currently have."

This summer, six A-10 Thunderbolt II aircraft with more than 100 Airmen from the 124th Fighter Wing, Idaho Air National Guard, traveled to Germany in support of Air Defender 2023, the largest collective defense exercise since the inception of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization in 1949.

Over the course of two weeks in June, Germany and its air force, or Luftwaffe, hosted more than 200 aircraft from over 20 countries participating alongside 40-plus Air National Guard units from 35 states. With the Air Force and Air National Guard contributing some 2,000 Airmen along with 100 aircraft to the exercise, the U.S is showcasing interoperability and reinforcing its commitment to partners both regionally and across the globe.

"We have to keep exercising this muscle so movements of this size become easier," said U.S. Air Force Col. Ryan Richardson, the Operations Group commander assigned to the 124th FW. "The amount of effort and manpower it took to get our aircraft, equipment and people over here is staggering. And though we ran into a few hurdles, our Airmen pulled it off."

With many units participating, Richardson believes integrating and practicing agile combat employment was vital to the success of this exercise.

Upon arriving in Western Europe, U.S. Airmen from the 175th Fighter Wing, Maryland National Guard, partnered with maintainers from the 124th FW to replace an aircraft engine overnight. This combined effort allowed the aircraft to arrive at its final destination in time for the exercise to kick off, the National Guard's motto of Always Ready, Always There.

During AD23, this integration continued on a multinational level.

German joint terminal attack controllers frequently travel to Idaho's premier training ranges to train with the 124th FW's A-10's and the Air Support Operations Squadron. AD23 enabled the Idaho Air National Guard to reunite and train with those German JTACs on German soil

"As we worked with the German JTACs. we were able to practice convoy escort, closeair ground support and air-interdiction training," said Richardson. "Additionally, we were provided the opportunity to fly with the Hellenic air force's F-16s and the Germany's 74th Tactical Air Wing Eurofighters, while practicing CAS with multinational forces."

These were bonus, self-directed exercises, said Richardson. AD23's primary flying operations were hosted and led by the Luftwaffe. The missions included two massive. multinational events in the north and south of Germany, where dozens of aircraft would coordinate with one another to execute specific daily objectives.

Mission planning on this scale required daily NATO-facilitated briefings, where representatives from every participating unit across Western Europe would converge to highlight strategic and tactical interoperability targets.

As conflicts persist around the globe, the need to meet aggression with credible deterrence is paramount. AD23 accomplished this on a multinational scale through strengthening our international relationship and emboldening our NATO allies











"I think this exercise was a huge win, not just for the 124th Fighter Wing, but for every participating unit and country," said Richardson. "We'll reap the benefits of the relationships we've built and the experiences we've had during Air Defender well into the future."

Idaho Welcomes Pacific Northwest's

FIRST TOTAL FORCE RECRUITING OFFICE

Idaho Air National Guard Recruiting, along with the 368th Recruiting Squadron assigned to Hill Air Force Base in Utah, hosted the grand opening of the Pacific Northwest's first Total Force Recruiting Office in Meridian, May 2.

If an applicant walked into the Air Force's newest Total Force Recruiting Office, they'd be hard-pressed to find a distinction between its Air National Guard and active duty Air Force halves. This is by design, said Senior Master Sgt. Casey Bermensolo, Idaho Air National Guard Recruiting superintendent.

"The benefit of sharing and collaborating in this space with our active duty counterparts is the opportunities we can provide prospective recruits," said Bermensolo. "If a customer isn't looking for something full-time, they have Guard recruiters at their disposal. If they're looking to explore full-time opportunities, active duty recruiters are 20 feet away."



Because Air Guard units maintain a smaller full-time force, they operate with less funding than their active duty counterparts and have historically lacked the resources to market and recruit on the same level. This partnership changes that, says Bermensolo.



"The Air National Guard has been the best kept secret in the military," said Bermensolo. "But because we historically have never had a storefront recruiting office, the awareness level, at least of the Idaho ANG, is low and we unfortunately don't receive the funding we need to get the word out."

The open floor plan in the new Total Force Recruiting Office facilitates synergy between the active and guards recruiting components. Furthermore, pairing active duty marketing resources with the ANG's community relationships is a win for the USAF as a whole, says Lt. Col. Annie Driscoll, 368th Recruiting Squadron commander.

"The great thing about this opportunity is the ANG has relationships that are deeply rooted within the community." said Driscoll.

"Because active duty recruiters are only in one location for three years at a time and Guard recruiters have been in their communities for decades. Guard recruiters are going to be able to open doors we wouldn't otherwise have access to and we have the resources needed to get the word out."

Utilizing this new total force recruiting construct, the Air Force hopes to eliminate redundancies in recruiting, bolster retention and better-utilize funding.

"This is the toughest it's been in a long time for both active duty and Air National Guard recruiting," said Driscoll, "The fact that we're forging these relationships and building this infrastructure during these complicated times, I believe, ensures our success going forward."





F-16 MISSION MAY BE COMING TO GOWEN STARTING IN 2027

The U.S. Air Force has identified the Idaho Air National Guard's 124th Fighter Wing to potentially receive an F-16 Fighting Falcon mission at Gowen Field in Boise, Idaho. F-16s are expected to begin arriving at Gowen Field in 2027.

"Idaho is proud of the critical role we have long played in supporting the nation's defense strategy through the valuable work of the men and women serving at Gowen Field," said Idaho Gov. Brad Little. "The transition to the sophisticated F-16 mission at Gowen Field is the next step in the Idaho Air National Guard's enduring commitment to safeguarding the liberties and freedoms we hold dear as Americans. This is an exciting step that will benefit the State of Idaho and the United States of America."

The IDANG has maintained a fighter mission at Gowen Field for more than 75 years. This transition would replace the 18 A-10 Thunderbolt IIs that have been in service at Gowen Field since 1996. The one-for-one exchange would include the same number of F-16s, which are a more advanced and combateffective aircraft.

The Air Force has planned to divest its aging A-10 inventory for more than a decade. Discussions have been ongoing among Idaho National Guard leaders, and local, state, and federal officials since 2012. Then, the IDANG was notified that their A-10 fleet was identified for divestment by 2015. However, events in Southwest Asia at the time extended the aircraft's relevance just as the 124th FW embarked on the largest deployment in its history the following year. The 124th FW deployed again in 2020 marking its second largest deployment.

This modernization will better align the Air Force to support the current National Defense Strategy by leveraging the 124th FW's existing fighter aircraft operations and maintenance expertise once the A-10s at Gowen Field are retired, beginning in the fall of 2026.

"Deterrence is a critical aspect of the National Defense Strategy," said Brig. Gen. Tim Donnellan, IDANG commander. "Today's near-peer adversaries like Russia and China remind us it's imperative to ensure our personnel are trained and proficient with the best equipment and tools necessary to fight and win our nation's wars."

The IDANG expects a more detailed timeline from the Air Force in the coming months that will outline the next steps, such as the completion of an environmental impact analysis, planned for the spring of 2025.

The IDANG has been a fixture of the community since 1946. Since then, Idaho National Guard pilots have transitioned through 9 different types of fighter aircraft. With each new aircraft, the organization modifies its noise abatement procedures to minimize the impacts of jet noise on the community.

"Idaho National Guardsmen are rooted in every community in the state," said Maj. Gen. Michael Garshak, adjutant general of Idaho. "When we are called upon, it's your friends, families and neighbors coming together to support our community and our nation. Being good stewards of our environment is a priority and we will ensure Boise continues to be one of the most livable cities in the country, regardless of the aircraft we operate."

THUNDERBIRDS ARRIVE IN BOISE
















A-10 PET-A-JET


