USAISEC HISTORY

Located in Cochise County, in southeast Arizona, about 15 miles north of the border with Mexico, Fort Huachuca is an Army installation with a rich frontier history. Established in 1877, the Fort was annexed in 1971 by the city of Sierra Vista and declared a national landmark in 1976.

Fort Huachuca is the largest employer in Cochise County and the largest economic contributor in Arizona. The Fort develops and tests command, control, communications, computers, cyber, intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance (C5ISR) capabilities; delivers intelligence and unmanned aircraft systems training and education; designs, develops and integrates intelligence capabilities, concepts and doctrine; and provides world-class quality support services in support of Army and Joint operations.



- July 23, 1963: The Computer Control Information Systems Group was established under the United States Army Combat Development Command. Its mission was to take a long-range objective look at automatic data processing system hardware from the viewpoint of field commanders and to develop, provide, and integrate automatic data processing on a time-phase basis.
- April 1, 1965: The Computer Control Information Systems Group was redesignated the Army Automatic Data Field Systems Command. Its mission was to integrate automatic data processing systems into the Army in the field.
- March 31, 1969: The Army Automatic Data Field Systems Command was redesignated as the United States Army Computer Systems Command as a field operating activity of the Headquarters, Department of the Army. Its mission was to consolidate, coordinate, and integrate responsibility for the total effort of the Army in operation of management information systems.
- October 1, 1984: The Computer Systems Command was redesignated the United States Army Information Systems Software Command (ISSC). Nine months later, ISSC was redesignated the United States Army Information Systems Engineering Command and became known as USAISEC or ISEC for short.
- October 1, 1987: USAISEC headquarters moved from Fort Belvoir, Virginia, to Fort Huachuca, Arizona, where it became a major subordinate command.
- October 1, 1996: The Chief of Staff of the Army authorized the consolidation of engineering activities under the Army Materiel Command. The United States Army Information Systems Engineering Command (USAISEC) then became a major subordinate command of the United States Army Communications-Electronics Command or CECOM.

Today, Fort Huachuca is a major military installation in Arizona and one of prominence throughout the Southwest. Throughout its rich history, USAISEC's focus has been, and remains, to provide world-class communications and logistics support to enable readiness to our warfighters as the C5ISR "Materiel Integrator" for the Army. Whether supporting our service members during disaster relief or combat deployments, USAISEC's global team of Trusted Professionals stand ready to support our Nation's most precious asset—the American Soldier.
