
## **MIRC Command Sergeant Major**

## **Vigilant Defender**

The 752nd MI BN (Counterintelligence) and partners representing all three Army components and from 18 units and organizations, conducted AT in the vicinity of San Juan/Ft. Buchanan, Puerto Rico.

Vigilant Defender 23 was the largest counterintelligence training event in USARC history and the first ever battalion level event since the 752nd was established in 2014. Key events included a Tier II EXEVAL evaluated by Army Counterintelligence Command (ACIC) and the ARISC for CI and analytic support requirements and a STAFFEX and DRE Level 1 evaluated by 1st Army. Our improvements must start with ensuring all Soldiers and Civilians complete Basic Risk Management training. Once we ensure our Soldiers and Civilians understand risk management, it can be effectively applied to on duty and off duty activities to reduce risks.

## 338th MI Battalion (Interrogation) participates in Titan Warrior alongside MPs

The 338th Military Intelligence Battalion (Interrogation), Interrogation Group, Military Intelligence Readiness Command, conducted annual training between July 23 and Aug. 4, 2023 and participated in Titan Warrior 23.

Titan Warrior 23 is an Army Reserve, multinational, multifunctional, military police exercise with a detention operations focus. The 290th Military Police Brigade, 200th Military Police Command hosted the exercise. Approximately 900 Soldiers participated this year.

Upon arrival at Titan Warrior, Soldiers conducted interrogations and debriefings at a newly established expeditionary Joint Interrogation Debriefing Center. The bat-



talion staff also rehearsed interfaces required to operate alongside military police units conducting detention operations missions.

Military intelligence Soldiers also received opportunities to train alongside soldiers from Canada and Belgium. The multinational contingent participated in detention facility operations.

U.S. Army Reserve Lt. Col. Tenay Benes, battalion commander of the 338th Military Intelligence Battalion, said, "The opportunity to test our screening, interrogation, debriefing, and interviewing tactics with our military police partners has proven to be invaluable. As a result of this exercise, we have discovered opportunities for increased collaboration and better coordination."
