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HISTORY OF THE 56TH THEATER INFORMATION OPERATIONS GROUP



When you think of Army Information Operations, you rarely think of Infantry, Artillery or Ordnance, but that is where the 56th TIOG started its path 100 years ago.

On September 30, 1918, Company D, 3d Infantry was organized and federally recognized in Seattle, Wash. The short lived Infantry Company was converted to Field Artillery in May 1921, under the flag of Battery D, 146th Field Artillery Regiment.

As tensions grew in the European and Pacific Theater during World War II, Battery D was called into federal service on February 16, 1940 for mobilization training in Seattle. Following the attack on Pearl Harbor, the unit conducted outreach to the community, preparing them for a possible attack in the Puget Sound area all while preparing to mobilize.

In February 1942, Battery D, was reorganized for mobilization to New Guinea at Battery A, 167th Field Artillery, under the 41st Infantry Division.

From 1942 to December 1945, the men of Battery A would fight in Luzon, Southern Philippines and travel to Japan for inactivation and demobilization back home.

After returning home, the unit moved from Seattle to Vancouver and continued to serve at Battery A until a consolidation in April 1959. Battery A joined with Service Battery to create Company A in the newly developed 241st Signal Battalion with a focus on communications. As part of the 41st Infantry Division the unit worked alongside other Washington National Guard units; 1st Battalion 161st Infantry and 2nd Battalion 146th Field Artillery.

The 1960s saw a lot of changes for the unit, as it would undergo multiple reorganizations, consolidations and moves. In October 1971 the unit saw one of its most important consolidations when it joined together with 115th Transportation Group, to become the 116th Support Center, stationed in Olympia before moving to Camp Murray.

In August 1990, the world saw a new threat emerging in the Middle East, as Saddam Hussein's Iraqi military invaded Kuwait, causing a reaction by the United States to mobilize more than 700,000 troops

for Operation Desert Shield from January 17, 1991 to February 28, 1991. Eight members of the 116th Support Center (Rear Area Operations) traveled to the Middle East on a 90-day tour in August 1991. As tensions on the Iraq, Saudi Arabia border heightened, the entire 80 member unit was mobilized on December 6, 1990 for a six-month tour in the Middle East. On June 24, 1991, all members would return home to Camp Murray. The unit was relocated to the Ellensburg armory in September 1992.

One more consolidation in September 2006 prepared the unit for its future reorganization as Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 56th TIOG, which was federally recognized in January 28, 2009, under the 96th Troop Command.

As conflicts around the world changed, a greater need for synchronizing the non-kinetic battlefield began to take shape. Unit commanders were asking more from non-traditional warfighters, like public affairs, civil affairs and psychological operations. The Army noticed that Information Operations was becoming as important to the combatant commanders as traditional means.

During a major transformation in July 2015, the Washington Army National Guard found the perfect opportunity to stand up the 56th TIOG as a Brigade-sized element.

"Placing units with similar missions in the same MSC provide better opportunities to support one another," said Col. (Ret) Curt Simonson, former commander, 56th TIOG in 2016. "This benefits our soldiers, the Washington Army National Guard and the commanders we support in the Pacific Theater."

The 56th TIOG, would now combined specialized units under one umbrella. Soldiers in the Military Intelligence, Special Operations and Information Operations career fields would work together for better collaboration and planning while completing their individual missions.

"Another commonality of these units is engagement in the Asia-Pacific region," said Simonson. "A significant portion of the Washington Army National Guard's participation in this region comes from special forces, military intelligence and information operations units. Bringing them together will make it easier to synchronize efforts in support of commanders in the Pacific."

UNIT BREAKDOWN

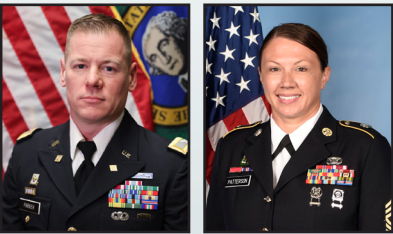

This 127,100-square-foot facility provides administrative, operations and specialized telecommunications spaces to serve as the headquarters of the 56th TIOG for the Washington Army National Guard. Designed for LEED Silver certification, the new facility features specialized administrative, planning, briefing and support areas to support the five operational units who occupy the facility. The work areas contain a mixture of command suites with self-contained private offices for each unit and large, open-plan workstation areas configured for a collaborative work environment. The facility at Joint Base Lewis-McChord reflects the character of the historic red brick facilities in the Old Fort District. The project was designed under contract with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Seattle District in collaboration with small business subconsultants Helix Design Group and AHBL. The project received a Seattle Society of American Military Engineers Project of Excellence Award and an Excellence in Masonry Award from the Masonry Institute of Washington.

110TH INFORMATION OPERATIONS BATTALION

The 110th IO welcomed home our two deployed IO field support teams from CJTF-HOA and JIATF-S. September marked our IO Staff Training Exercise, which serves to validate our outgoing IO field support teams. We also celebrated the promotions of MAJ Fox and LTC Adams. In 2023, the 141st Military History Detachment returned from a very successful deployment in the Middle East. The 122nd TPASE supported the Washington National Guard's public affairs efforts covering over 30 events statewide, highlighting service members, units, and training. The 156th Information Operations Battalion spent 2023 focusing on Basic Soldiering Skills through tough realistic training, Readiness Oriented Tasks, Mobilizing Field Support Teams, and Overseas Deployments for Training throughout INDOPACOM. The BN continues to prepare and deploy Field Support Teams on a heal to toe rotation in support of Special Operations Joint Task Force - Operation Inherent Resolve in Jordan and Iraq. The Battalion remained closely tied to our regionally aligned Compo one counter parts in the INDOPACIFIC Theater while supporting training events such as Cobra Gold, Cyber Shield, and Talisman Sabre. 341ST MILITARY INTELLIGENCE BATTALION (LINGUIST)

The 341st Military Intelligence Battalion (Linguist) cemented our commitment to the alignment to the USINDOPA-COM AOR and the 500th MIB-T by developing a sustainment augmentation model providing agile and sustainable support past 2030. The Soldiers of the 341st successfully supported numerous engagements, events, and exercises aligned to USARPAC objectives and requirements. These included Vigilant Pacific, Yama Sakura, and Key Insight. Department of the Army G2, LTG Laura Potter, recognized the work accomplished by the 300th Military Intelligence Brigade (Linguist) and its subordinate battalions, including the 341st, as "phenomenal" during the ARNG G2 Workshop. In FY23, The 341st MI BN (LING) sent a team of linguists to compete in the Polyglot Games in Utah, three of whom placed in individual competition. In Q4FY23, we sent Soldiers to hone their intelligence skills at the FY23 Panther Strike exercise, also in Utah. Finally, in Q1FY24, the 341st executed its first annual Valor Language Games, testing our tradecraft and language skills to set future benchmarks. Moreover, we continued our efforts to support civil authorities by training Soldiers in Wildland Firefighting. Our Soldiers have been postured over the past several summers to respond anywhere in the state to support fire suppression efforts and protect life and property. This past year, we welcomed back numerous deployed personnel from across the globe supporting America's National Security Objectives in the CENTCOM and EUCOM AORs. These Soldiers supported 10th Mountain Division and Alpha Company, 1st Battalion/19th Special Forces Group (A). As we look ahead, the 341st MI BN (LING) is postured now more than ever to provide intelligence and language support capabilities to drive operations in the Pacific.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS DETACHMENT - PACIFIC (SOD-P)

SOD-P continued to support special operations within the USINDOPACOM AOR in 2023. As of 2021, SOD-P assumed full responsibility for planning, resourcing and executing the Special Operations contingent of the Staff Planning Exercise (STAFFEX) and the Command Post Exercise (CPX) for COBRA GOLD. COBRA GOLD is a large JCS exercise in the Kingdom of Thailand, one of Washington State Partnership Program's (SPP) partners. The 2023 year saw SOD-P execute the COBRA GOLD 23 STAFFEX along with a weeklong Joint Special Operations University (JSOU) led Bilateral Exercise with our Thai Special Forces partners. In preparation for COBRA GOLD 24, SOD-P also attended two separate two week planning conferences in Thailand. Finally, SOD-P members worked on Special Operations Forces - Conventional Force Interdependence, Interoperability and Integration (SOF-CF I3) in another exercise in Malaysia: KERIS STRIKE 23. SOD-P successfully brought SOF integration to a traditionally conventional exercise in Malaysia, Washington's State's other international partner. The SOD's performance at KERIS STRIKE laid the groundwork for more SOF-CF I3 in 2024 in the form of a Rigger Subject Matter Expert Exchange (SMEE) through the auspices of SPP. SOD-P achieved all of these effects while also working on some major deliverables for SOCPAC while at home station.

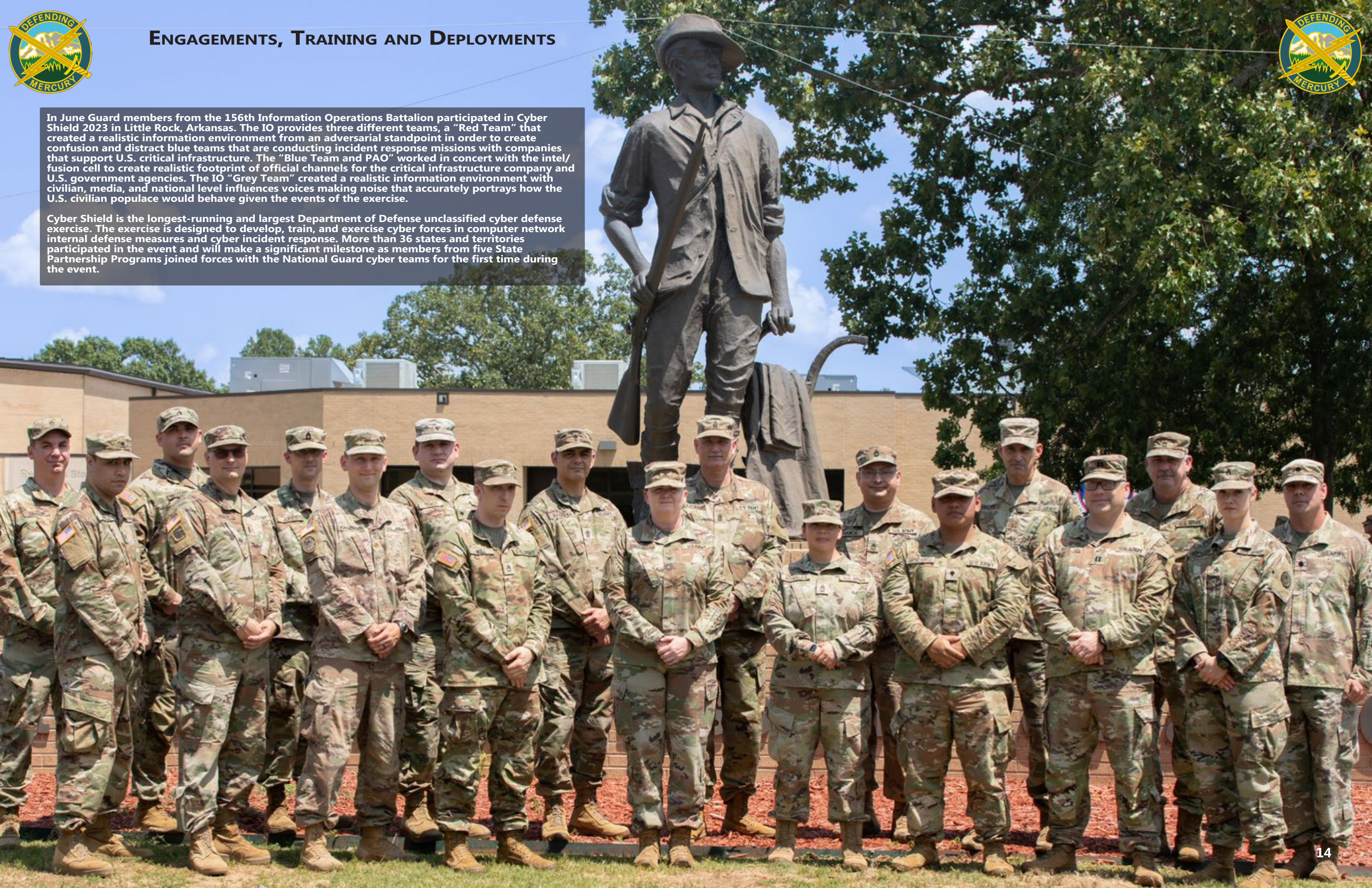


ENGAGEMENTS, TRAINING AND DEPLOYMENTS



In June Guard members from the 156th Information Operations Battalion participated in Cyber Shield 2023 in Little Rock, Arkansas. The IO provides three different teams, a "Red Team" that created a realistic information environment from an adversarial standpoint in order to create confusion and distract blue teams that are conducting incident response missions with companies that support U.S. critical infrastructure. The "Blue Team and PAO" worked in concert with the intel/fusion cell to create realistic footprint of official channels for the critical infrastructure company and U.S. government agencies. The IO "Grey Team" created a realistic information environment with civilian, media, and national level influences voices making noise that accurately portrays how the U.S. civilian populace would behave given the events of the exercise.

Cyber Shield is the longest-running and largest Department of Defense unclassified cyber defense exercise. The exercise is designed to develop, train, and exercise cyber forces in computer network internal defense measures and cyber incident response. More than 36 states and territories participated in the event and will make a significant milestone as members from five State Partnership Programs joined forces with the National Guard cyber teams for the first time during the event.

FIELD SUPPORT TEAM OLYMPICS - JULY

During July drill the 156th Information Operations Battalion executed the annual Field Support Team Olympics. The winning Field Support Team was recognized during a Battalion MWR event for their hard work and dedication. The Battalion was able to execute a leaflet drop that had not been exercised by both the Aviation community or Military Information Support Operations community in more than ten years. Events during the Olympics included, air movement, physical fitness event, Information Operations related lane training.

COBRA GOLD 2023 - MARCH

12 members of the 122nd Theater Public Affairs Support Element provided coverage during Cobra Gold 23 in Utapao, Kingdom of Thailand. Cobra Gold is a Thai-U.S. co-sponsored training event that builds on the longstanding friendship between the two allied nations and brings together a robust multinational force to promote regional peace and security in support of a free and open Indo-Pacific.



VALOR LANGUAGE GAMES - NOVEMBER

Soldiers with the 341st Military Intelligence Battalion (Linguist) put their language skills to the test during the annual Valor Language Games on Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Wash., Nov. 4, 2023. The Valor Language Games, named after the battalion's call sign and motto, "Vigilance and Valor", consists of three events, each testing intelligence soldiers on their expertise in tactical questioning, voice intercept/analysis, and briefing a senior office on the commander's priority intelligence requirements (PIR) they found during their questioning. Linguists are tested as individuals and as a team on their abilities to read, speak, and listen to the languages including Russian, Korean, Chinese, Spanish and French.

OCS PHASE III - JULY

In July the 122nd TPASE led a multi-state public affairs team to provide coverage of the 205th Regiment led Officer Candidate School Phase III, at Joint Base Lewis-McChord. OCS Phase III is the culminating event for National Guard Officer Candidates testing their leadership and critical thinking abilities prior to commissioning as second lieutenants in the U.S. Army. The team set the standard for future OCS iterations and built relationships among other states to tell the story.



HONORING MSG SANTOYO - SEPTEMBER

Alpha Company and SOD-P conducted a combined airborne operation where former A Co Commander and SOD-P member LTC(R) Matt Casteel attended the operation. During the airborne operation, MSG Santoyo, a Green Beret that inspired LTC (R) Casteel to become a Green Beret, had his final wishes met. LTC Frey conducted a combat equipment jump with MSG Santoyo's ashes inside the ruck sack, as MSG Santoyo wished to have his ashes jumped during in an airborne operation in his final days. The Santoyo family joined A Co and SOD-P on the Drop Zone and shared stories with the current Soldiers, ensuring the preservation of our SOF legacy.
