


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
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EDITOR'S NOTE

The 1st Infantry Division hosted a U.S. Army All American Bowl Selection, at Victory Hall, Fort Riley, Kansas on Dec. 7, 2023.

U.S. Army Col. Terry Tillis, the deputy commander of maneuver, 1st Inf. Div., honored Michael Boganowski, a student attending Junction City High School, who received an invitation to attend the U.S. Army American Bowl. Bowl week invites many of the nation's top players and teams to showcase their ability and compete on the nation's biggest football stage.

Selected for his talent in the field, Boganowski is a 6-2, 195-pound Linebacker who finished his high school season with 123 Total tackles (67 solo, three for loss), four interceptions, one forced fumble, one passing touch-

down, and two rushing touchdowns. He is being highlighted by the 1st Inf. Div. because he was the number one pick in the state to attend the bowl.

"I've been blessed with a few talents, and I work very hard on and off the field that has helped me be put into this spot," said Boganowski.

U.S. Army Col. Terry Tillis, the deputy commander of maneuver, 1st Inf. Div., spoke about his history with the Boganowski family which dates back to 2013. Boganowski's father, Master Sgt. Michael Boganowski Sr., is a Soldier assigned to Fort Riley. Tillis congratulated the family on Boganowski's athletic success. Tillis had last seen Boganowski as a child and spoke to how amazed he was with the young man he had grown up to be.

"It's your values that have made you different, it's your discipline, your drive, the grit that you give," said Tillis. "It's your family that have all been a part of you becoming the young man that you are. Congratulations on not only this but we believe you have a bright future, we're excited to be cheering for you, and to the family, thank you for your tremendous sacrifices that have helped him get to where he is."

Randall Zimmerman, the head football coach of Junction City high school also attended the ceremony in support of Boganowski.

"I'd like to thank Fort Riley, the U.S. Army, and all military branches for what you do here and abroad to allow young people like Michael and

Boganowski was presented with the jersey he will wear in the upcoming game by the U.S. Army All American Bowl Chairmen Richard McGuinness. "On behalf of the U.S. Army and the U.S. Army All American Bowl, for the 2023 class you are one the top 80 players in the country, congratulations, you deserve it," said McGuinness.

1ID SUSTAINMENT BRIGADE RECEIVES NEW COMMAND SERGEANT MAJOR

The 1st Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade conducted a change of responsibility ceremony at King Field House on Fort Riley, Kansas, Dec. 12, 2023.

Durable senior leaders, Soldiers, friends and family, attended the event to bid farewell to U.S. Army Command Sgt. Maj. Clarence Raby, the outgoing 1st Inf. Div. Sust. Bde. command sergeant major, and welcome Command Sgt. Maj. Adam Bezanson, the incoming 1st Inf. Div. Sust. Bde. command sergeant major.

Bezanson, a native from Helena, Montana, enlisted into the Army in August of 2002 as a culinary specialist. Bezanson's stateside assignments include, but not limited to, Golf Company, 1-319th Airborne Field Artillery Regiment, Fort Lib-

erty, North Carolina; Headquarters and Headquarters Company, Special Troops Battalion, I Corps, Joint Base Lewis McChord, Washington; Joint Staff, Washington D.C.; 1st Special Forces Group (Airborne), United States Army Sergeant Major Academy, Fort Bliss. His overseas assignments are United States Forces Korea, Yongsan, Republic of Korea and U.S. Army Europe and Africa in Wiesbaden, Germany. He deployed to Iraq three times in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom and Afghanistan twice in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

The official change of responsibility is accomplished with the transfer of the unit guidon, which represents not only the lineage and honor of the unit but also the loyalty and unity of its Soldiers. The passing of the

guidon symbolizes the transfer of responsibility from one command sergeant major to another.

Raby passed the guidon to Lt. Col. Charles Montgomery, the 1st Inf. Div. Sust. Bde., 1st Inf. Div. commander, who then passed the guidon to Bezanson, entrusting him with responsibility of the unit. As the colors passed through the trio, Raby's responsibility to the Durable Brigade ended.

Montgomery gave his remarks, praising the accomplishments of Raby during his time with the Big Red One and the positive impression he had about him from their first day together as Durable Brigade leaders.

over the last 30 months,” Montgomery said. “I had immediate trust in Command Sgt. Maj. Raby the moment I arrived and he did not disappoint in any manner.”

Coming to the end of his speech, Montgomery welcomed Bezanson and expressed trust in the new command sergeant major’s ability to lead the brigade alongside him.

Raby delivered a heartfelt speech, expressing his gratitude to his family, the command teams across the division and the leaders he served under, for their support, mentorship, and for making him a better non-commissioned officer and leader. Raby expressed his appreciation to all the Soldiers for working hard to make not only the brigade better, but the entire organization.

“Serving as your Command Sergeant Major has been the greatest honor of my career,” Raby said. “The successes of the brigade are a testament to the teamwork, discipline, and commitment that make this unit exceptional. U.S. Army Maj. Gen. John V. Meyer III and Command Sgt. Maj. Derek Noyes, command team of the 1st Infantry Division and Fort Riley, hosted a ball culminating a yearlong campaign honoring the essential role noncommissioned officers play in the United States Military, at the Hilton Garden Inn in Manhattan, Kansas, Dec. 14, 2023.

The role of the modern American NCO, as the event's guest speaker Sgt. Maj. of the Army (retired) Daniel A. Dailey said in his speech, has been molded through the advent of war throughout the country's history, and includes vast duties, responsibilities and authorities.

“We win because we have a noncommissioned officer corps that trains Soldiers to standard, enforces those standards, and holds everybody accountable, from private to major general, throughout this division,” said Meyer. “The noncommissioned officer runs the United States Army.”

Known as the backbone of the Army, NCOs are responsible for the care and training of Soldiers. They have played a pivotal role in every conflict since the founding of the U.S. Army, and are a paramount fixture in every American military victory from Gettysburg to Normandy, and beyond.

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The bedrock of the Corps of noncommissioned officers was built during the American Revolution and the appointing of Baron von Steuben as Inspector General of the Army in 1778, who standardized the duties and responsibilities of the NCO by creating the regulation of the order and discipline of the troops.

"Ladies and gentlemen, what you have accomplished here at the Big Red One is not just another campaign with a nice banner and a few events," said Dailey. "What you have done is sent a message; a clear message to our officer corps and all those who lead this great army,

that the trust between us and them is a sacred bond that cannot be broken.

"What you have done is sent a clear message that the United States Army will continue to do what it's supposed to do regardless of their allegiance to anything outside what our common cause is, that is to defend the Constitution of the United States of America."

With the close of the Year of the NCO begins the Year of Victory, the next chapter in the ongoing effort to recount the history of the Big Red One and recognize its victorious past, while honoring former




