


















n Oct. 26, 1917 in Bourmont, France, the 2nd Infantry Division was born, quite literally, on a battlefield. Through every major U.S. engagement in 'The War to End All Wars', the Indianhead Division served with distinction and was awarded the French 'Croix de Guerre' three times, signified by a special lanyard on modern dress uniforms.

After World War I, the unit moved to Fort Sam Houston, but soon found itself back in France. This time landing on Omaha Beach as part of Operation Overlord and the liberation of Europe from Nazi control. Fighting from Normandy to the Rhine, from Leipzig to Pilsen, the 2nd Infantry Division was in combat from their first day in France to V.E.(Victory in Europe) Day on May 8, 1945. After the war, they were stationed at Fort Lewis, Wash., but would not have long to rest.

June 25, 1950, the Korean War started with an assault by the North Korean People's Army into the South. The 2nd Infantry Division landed in Korea on July 23 - the first unit to reach Korea from the United States - and relieved the 24th Infantry at the Naktong River Line a month later. The Battle of Naktong was the first trial for the Division; a grueling 16-day offensive that tested the U.S. and Korean forces. But, the Division held and on September 16 joined in the breakout of the Pusan Perimeter and the northward offensive, taking back Seoul and reaching the 38th Parallel on Oct. 1, 1950.


The Korean War came to a stalemate on July 27, 1953 with the establishment of the Korean Demilitarized Zone, and the 2nd Infantry Division took on a training and support role until they redeployed to Fort Lewis in 1954. The Division returned to Korea in 1965 to counter a growing threat from North Korean attacks on the DMZ and attempts to cross the border, taking control of the Joint Security Area in Panmuniom.

Since that time, the 2nd Infantry Division has been a consistent partner to the Republic of Korea army and the communities that grew and thrived in the post-war boom. From the JSA and Camp Casey in Dongducheon, to the former headquarters at Camp Red Cloud in Uijeongbu, the Indianhead Division trained, fought and lived beside their Korean counterparts. Even when members of the 2nd Infantry Division deployed from Korea to Iraq as part of the War on Terror, the Division continued to train and prepare against North Korean aggression.

On June 3, 2015, the 2nd Infantry Division partnered with the ROK 16th Mechanized Brigade to become the ROK/U.S. Combined Division, the first of its kind in the Army. Today, the Division is the last permanently forward -stationed Division in the Army, showing its commitment to our partners in the Republic of Korea, our determination against a continuing threat, and our capability to "Fight Tonight".

2nd Combat Aviation Brigade

The 2nd Combat Aviation Brigade is the 2nd Infantry Division's dedicated air unit, providing fire and support for the ROK-U.S. alliance. Consisting of over 180 aircraft, from cargo and attack helicopters to unmanned aerial vehicles, the Talon Brigade covers a wide range of missions across the Republic of Korea and in cooperation with ROK army allies.

"Talon Warriors" consists of the 2nd Assault Helicopter Battalion, 2nd Aviation Regiment located at Seoul Air Base, the 3rd General Support Aviation Battalion, the 4th Attack Aviation Battalion, the 5th Air Cavalry Squadron, 17th Cavalry Regiment, and the 602d Aviation Support Battalion.


In armistice, the 2nd Combat Aviation Brigade deters aggression and strengthens the ROK/U.S. Alliance. Talon stands ready to assist their Korean partners at all times. In the past they have provided assistance by fighting wildfires across the peninsula, responding to calls for aviation medical evacuation and building lasting relationships with the local community through outreach events.


In contingency operations, 2CAB conducts air-ground operations and noncombatant evacuation in the Korean Theater of Operations to defend the Republic of Korea. They Train To "Fight Tonight," year-round through various exercises such as the Maritime Counter Special Forces Exercise with the U.S. and ROK navy and air forces, air assaulting with the rotational brigade during validation exercises and various forms of gunnery on all helicopter platforms.

210th Field Artillery Brigade

The 210th Field Artillery Brigade is the U.S. Army's only permanently forward stationed field artillery brigade that provides a crucial and strategic capability.


The 'Thunder Brigade' is an incredible team of field artillery professionals and operates in support of and alongside their ROK army counterparts every single day. 210 FAB adds to as well as benefits from the expertise from Combined Forces Command, ROK Ground Operation Command's Counter Fire Task Force, 2nd Infantry Division/ROK-U.S. Combined Division, Eighth Army, U.S. Forces Korea, and the individual Soldiers on the line.

The Thunder Brigade is capable of delivering precision fires with incredible accuracy. It has no equal on the Korean peninsula. From the

Joint Security Area, to the multiple launch rocket systems crewmen on the line, 210 Field Artillery Brigade stands Second to None.

On order, the 210th Field Artillery Brigade alerts and assembles, uploads, deploys and provides fires in support to the 2nd Infantry Division, Combined Forces Command and the Ground Component Commander Counter Fire Task Force to destroy enemy long range artillery.

Whether assigned to 210th FAB Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 1st Battalion, 38 Field Artillery Regiment "Steel Behind the Rock", 6th Battalion, 37th Field Artillery Regiment "On the Minute", 70th Brigade Support Battalion or one of the rotational units attached to 210th FAB, it's an honor to be a part of the Thunder Family.







2nd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade

제2보병사단 지원여단 The 2nd Infantry Division/ROK-U.S. Combined Division Sustainment Brigade is a multifunctional fighting force, providing support to the warfighters of the United States and our allies, as well as providing logistical support to the 2ID/RUCD and all U.S. Army units garrisoned on the Korean Peninsula. Formerly the 501st Sustainment Brigade, it was reflagged as the 2ID DSB, and became a direct reporting unit to the 2nd Infantry Division on July 7, 2015.

The 2ID DSB 'Champion Brigade' consists of four battalions: the Division Special Troops Battalion, 11th Engineer Battalion, 23d Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Battalion, and the 194th Division Sustainment Support Battalion.

On Sep. 16, 2020, the brigade was converted into the U.S. Army's first division sustainment brigade. Under this force design update, the brigade was assigned to the 2nd Infantry Division/ROK-U.S. Combined Division and reorganized with organic functional companies, which provides the division with increased mobility, distribution, fuel, and forward maintenance capabilities. With this conversion and growth, the Champion Brigade furthers the Warrior Division's capability to close with and destroy the enemy and fight our nation's wars.


The DSB manages the flow of logistics into the area of operations and provides support to other services for common logistics like fuel, ammo, medical supplies, and repair parts of wheeled vehicles. In addition, the brigade is primarily concerned with the continuous management and distribution of stocks, human resources support, execution of financial management support, and allocation of critical supplies in the area of operations to provide operational reach to maneuver commanders.













2nd Infantry Division Artillery

2ID DIVARTY plans, prepares, executes, and assesses joint and multinational fires in support of Large Scale Combat Operation in support of the US-ROK Alliance.

The Fires Brigade, 2nd Infantry Division was originally constituted on Sep. 21, 1917 as the 2nd Field Artillery Brigade. The unit was partially organized in October 1917 at Governors Island, N.Y., and assigned to the 2nd Division (later redesignated as the 2nd Infantry Division). The organization was completed on Jan. 1, 1918 in Le Valdahon, France. During World War I, firing in support of both U.S. and Allied Forces, the 2nd Field Artillery Brigade participated in key battles fought at Aisne, Ile de France, Aisne-Marne, Lorraine, and Meuse-Argonne. For its actions, the unit was awarded the French Croix de Guerre with two palms and the French Fourragere. Following the war, the unit returned to Fort Sam Houston and was disbanded on Oct. 7, 1939.

From 1965 through 2006, DIVARTY


was stationed at Camp Stanley, Korea, ready to fight and deter North Korean aggression. The headquarters of the 2nd Division Artillery relocated from Camp Stanley to Camp Casey in September 2005 as part of the 2nd Infantry Division transformation plan. Under the transformation of the 2nd Infantry Division to the U.S. Army's new modular force structure, the 2nd Division Artillery was inactivated and reactivated as 2nd Fires Brigade. This unit consisted of a Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 6-37th Field Artillery, and 1-38th Field Artillery, all stationed at Camp Casey, and the 702nd Brigade Support Battalion at Camp Castle. On Nov. 30, 2006, the Fires Brigade, 2nd Infantry Division was inactivated, and personnel reflagged as the 210th Fires Brigade. On Sep. 25, 2014, the 2nd Division Artillery reactivated on Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Wash. Subsequently, the DIVARTY relocated from JBLM, Wash., and was reestablished on USAG-Humphrevs on Sep. 16, 2021.



3rd Cavarly Regiment

he 3rd Cavalry Regiment was first organized in 1846 as an elite mounted riflemen regiment that combined the mobility of the cavalry horse with the shock of heavy infantry and the long-range effective fire power of the new rifled musket. The Mounted Rifles were formed to safeguard settlers on the frontier, but the outbreak of the Mexican War necessitated their deployment to Mexico that year. The Regiment distinguished itself throughout the Mexican War from its first battle at Vera Cruz to the storming of Chapultepec Fortress in Mexico City, earning it the title, "Brave Rifles". The 3rd Cayalry Regiment is a Combined-Arms Cavalry Team primarily equipped with Strykers and composed of Brave Rifles tough troopers from all military occupational specialties and skill sets. They are the III Armored Corps' Cavalry Regiment, capable of operating as a reconnaissance and security force or close with and destroy as a Stryker Brigade Combat Team. They move and close with the enemy at the speed of an Armored Brigade Combat Team, fight at the speed of an Infantry Brigade Combat Team and consolidate gains faster than both. The 3rd Cavalry Regiment develops and maintains the highest level of readiness to deter aggression; and if deterrence fails "Fight Tonight" on the Korea Peninsula to support the U.S.-ROK Alliance while continuing to develop Army leaders for the future.











CAMP HUMPHREYS

Constructed as the Pyeongtaek Airfield in 1919 and renamed after Chief Warrant Officer Benjamin K. Humphreys in 1962, Camp Humphreys has grown from a support node for the bases in the region to the home of Eighth Army, United States Forces Korea, and the 2nd Infantry Division. As the largest U.S. overseas base and with a full range of DoDEA schools, entertainment venues and housing on and off base for Families, Camp Humphreys is a symbol of the commitment to the ROK/U.S. Alliance.


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Downtown Square, next to the PX and commissary, includes a bowling alley, MWR facility, theater, Texas Roadhouse restaurant and fully furnished crafts center for all ages.

CAMP CASEY






One of the oldest U.S. bases in Korea, Camp Casey has always been a part of the history of the 2nd Infantry Division on the peninsula. Named for Maj. Hugh Boyd Casey in 1952, Camp Casey has stood the test of time and is now home to the 210th Field Artillery Brigade and the rotational units assigned to the Warrior Division.

Right outside Camp Casey gate is Dongducheon, and close to post is Mt. Soyosan, both important cultural centers for the province. Dongducheon is well known for its maple and rock festivals, and Soyosan is a tourist attraction that brings in visitors from across Korea.



In that case the pairing of the chicken and beer is called *Chimaek*.







