Jurney enlisted in the Marine Corps in 1987 as an infantryman and was commissioned a year later through the Enlisted Commissioning Program. He was a rifle platoon commander and company executive officer during Operation Desert Storm. He later became

commanding officer of 1st Battalion, 6th Marines, deploying twice to support Operation Iraqi Freedom.



Jurney was also appointed as chief of plans at U.S. Joint Forces Command, Commanding General at Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego, and Commanding General for II Marine Expeditionary Force,

further developing his leadership. In September 2022, he assumed command of MARFORPAC.


"I may be new to the team, but I'm not a stranger to INDOPACOM or MARFORPAC's role in the region and nation," said Jurney when he first assumed command. "I've got no doubt the Marines will continue to contribute significantly."

3d MLR Conducts Beacon Star

MARINE CORPS BASE HAWAII - U.S. Marines with 3d Marine Littoral Regiment conducted Beacon Star, a staff planning exercise, on Marine Corps Base Hawaii from 17-27 September, 2024. Beacon Star is focused on staff education, staff planning, and battalion-led field training in order to set conditions for 3d MLR's upcoming Service Level Training Exercise and Marine Corps Combat Readiness and Evaluation Exercise.

During the two weeks of Beacon Star's execution, 3d MLR's 3 subordinate battalions - 3d Littoral Logistics Battalion, 3d Littoral Anti-Air Battalion, and 3d Littoral Combat Team - conducted battalion level and below training in various training areas around Oahu. 3d MLR's staff conducted a successful Marine Corps Planning Process repetition that produced an executable operations order and for SLTE-Hawaii. Another outcome of Beacon Star was the beginning of phased planning for 3d MLR's

second annual deployment to the Philippines, scheduled for 2025.

Staff planning exercises are essential to the Marine Corps ability to identify what capabilities, personnel, and equipment are necessary for a given task or mission prior to its execution. 3d MLR's successful conclusion of Beacon Star demonstrated the unit's "fight now" mentality by readying and posturing its forces to deploy within a moment's notice.
