Major General Jill K. Faris is a member of the Ohio Army National Guard. She assumed her duties as Chief of Staff, United States Army Medical Command on 1 October 2024. She began her military service as a Private in the South Dakota Army National Guard and upon graduation from South Dakota State University, Brookings, South Dakota, in 1987 received her commission. She has served as a member of

the South Dakota, Minnesota and Ohio Army National Guard, respectively, during her 42 years of service.

She has served in all medical operations positions from company through Division and Joint Force Headquarters.
