Community Responsibility

Working together, we can minimize conflicts with coyotes while respecting their role in the local ecosystem. Stay vigilant, follow these guidelines, and help keep the Marine Corps Logistics Base safe for everyone.

Don't Feed Coyotes:

Never feed coyotes. Secure all trash cans and remove outdoor food sources to include pet food.

Protect Pets:

Always supervise pets outdoors, especially at dawn, dusk and nightime.

Secure Your Property:

Close off potential access points. Install motion-sensor lighting and maintain fences.

Keep A Safe Distance:

If you encounter a coyote, do not approach it.

Know What To Do In An Encounter:

Act assertively: Clap, yell or throw small objects to scare the coyote away.

Do not run: Running may trigger the coyote's instinct to chase.

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



elebrating Earth Day in 2025 incorporates several activities aboard Marine Corps
Logistics Base Barstow, California.
These include a basewide cleanup, educational events, interactive events, and this year, it even included the rescue of two red-eared slider turtles.

"Earth Day is an annual event celebrated on April 22 to raise awareness about environmental protection and sustainability," said Elizabeth Bonner, Natural and Cultural Resources specialist. "It serves as a reminder of the importance of preserving natural resources and encourages individuals and organizations to take action toward a healthier planet."

Earth Day was first observed on April 22, 1970. It was founded by U.S. Senator Gaylord Nelson as a way to bring national attention to environmental issues.

"The movement led to the creation of major environmental policies, such as the Clean Air Act, Clean Water Act, and the establishment of the Environmental Protection Agency," Barron said. "Earth Day is important to the base because it aligns with our mission of environmental stewardship, sustainability, and resource conservation. Military installations often manage vast lands, water resources, and wildlife habitats, making it crucial to implement sustainable practices."

Participating in Earth Day activities, such as clean-up events, tree plantings, or recycling initiatives, can help to ensure that the base remains a responsible steward of the environment while supporting mission readiness.

"In the case of recycling initiatives, it can even save us money," Barron said!

The Basewide Clean-up was held on April 22, and personnel from all around the base spent two hours weed-eating, digging up tumbleweeds, bagging trash and placing plant debris into burlap tarps for proper disposal.

The Bottles-Up Challenge ran throughout the month of April, with personnel from each department competing for which turned in the most recycles for the month. Winning department will be announced in May.

Additional ways that personnel and families on base can participate in supporing a healthier planet include disposing of trash and

recycling in apppriate receptacles and taking trash out regularly for pick-up.

"You can also reduce your use of plastics, conserve water and properly dispose of properly dispose of hazardous materials," Barron said.

As for the red-eared slider turtles that were rescued... they simply meandered into a potentially dangerous location and were returned to where they came from as quickly as possible.

"Two red-eared sliders, escapees from a nearby restaurant pond, made their way onto base," said Liz Barron, Natural & Cultural Resources specialist aboard Marine Corps Logistics Base Barstow, California. April 14."

"While these turles may look cute, one was sick and posed a serious risk to our native desert tortoise populations by potentially spreading disease," Barron said. "This is a reminder to keep a close eye on your pets and ensure they're secure, especially near sensitive habitats. Let's work together to protect our wildlife and prevent the spread of harmful pathogens."






















Public Safety Telecommunicator Week

Although their work is 24 hours per day, seven days per week,

Public Safety Tellecommunicator Week is celebrated across the country, each year, April 13 -19.

"These individuals completed and maintained a significant amount of training to complete their tasks as PSTs." Silva said. "MCLB Barstow's Dispatch is a 24-hour Communications Center. The Public Safety Telecommunicators work holidays, weekends, and birthdays."

The team is dedicated in the public safety of the installation, as well as surrounding areas, which are outlined in Mutual Aid Agreements.

"Public Safety Telecommunicators are often the first point of contact in an emergency," Silva said. "They begin the important work of obtaining essential information, remaining calm, calming others, and sending the appropriate responders to the right location. They also provide instructions to the 911 caller, which in many cases is essential to stabilizing or saving a life."

These professional communicators are also tasked to conduct a driver license checks, and wants and warrants checks, on individuals entering NEBO and the Yermo Annex.

"The MCLB Barstow Police and Fire have Mutual Aid Agreements with Barstow Police Department, California Highway Patrol, the CHP dispatch center, Cal-fire, Barstow Fire Protection District, and the Army's Fort Irwin National Training Center Fire," Bilyeu said. "These agencies contact the telecommunicators at MCLB Barstow when fire or police services are needed and MCLB Barstow's PSTs dispatch the appropriate personnel. PSTs at MCLB also are involved in training drills that help the center prepare scenarios that may arise. Public Safety Telecommunicators are a vital role in Public Safety. They are often heard but not seen. The 2nd week of April of every year helps bring light to these unseen heroes that dedicate so much to the care of other."
