This UTA was brought in with some rain and more rain. That didn't stop us from celebrating our 2025 Outstanding Airmen of the Year. Here are a few (but not all) of their accomplishments: In our AMN category winner, A1C Tyler Barney was an interim scheduler and coordinated a multitude of operational missions, local training missions, and over 500 simulator events. He managed 1,740 training days and \$235K in travel funds. As a loadmaster he flew 186 hours on 62 sorties and contributed to operations FREEDOM'S SENTINEL and INHERENT RESOLVE. In the NCO category, MSgt (then TSgt) Alex Barb, was the WV ANG rep for SECAF's international affair office and played a key role in diplomatic relations with our new State Partner Gabon. He advocated for E-6 and below ranks for the career enlisted aviator grade review which secured appropriate rank structures for 2,900 aviators. He was also a key stake holder in the Ops Group's \$10.5 Million maintenance operations project. He also participated in numerous operational missions and exercises. Finally, in our SNCO category, MSgt Sara Church had dual roles as a services superintendent and installation personnel readiness NCOIC. She processed 314 members for critical missions while leading a flight of 25 Airmen. Sara played a vital role in personnel readiness by verifying eligibility for 336 members and issuing 175 deployment orders while streamlining processes for the 2024 Sentry Unicorn REV. She also oversaw \$20k In DFAC repairs and spearheaded a cashless DFAC transition all while managing a \$114K lodging budget and saving the unit \$15K sourcing MRE's. All of our winners also supported their fellow Airmen and their community in various ways throughout the year. Congratulations winners and keep up the great work!

Last week the wing had a great opportunity to meet one of the first 167th Aeromedical Evacuation (AE) airmen. Janet Hughes joined the wing in 1958 and served for four years. She was an inspiration on many levels. She currently holds the World Record in the 800m and one mile. She set those aged based records at age 85 running the mile in nine minutes. She was excited to be here and see all the changes, but the wing was equally excited to host her. A photo of her and the original AE personnel is in the heritage room in Bld 120.

Finally, I want to congratulate SMSgt Michael Seavolt from the Security Forces Squadron, who was recently promoted to SMSgt. I also want to give a big congrats to Lt Col Kevin Marmillion from the Operations Group and TSgt Rebekah Duvall from MSG on their retirements after decades of service..

167th Airlift Wing's Outstanding Airmen of the Year recognized during ceremony

The 167th Airlift Wing's Outstanding Airmen of the Year were recognized during a ceremony in the wing's dining facility, May 3.

The Outstanding Airman of the Year award program recognizes Airmen for their superior leadership, job performance, personal achievement and community involvement.

Airman 1st Class Tyler Barney, 167th Airlift Squadron, Master Sgt. Alex Barb, 167th Operations Support Squadron and Master Sgt. Sara Church, 167th Force Support Squadron were honored as the top Airman, Non-commissioned Officer and Senior Non-commissioned Officer, respectively for the wing. Barney and Barb were also recognized as the Outstanding Airmen of the Year in their categories for the West Virginia Air National Guard.

"In this wing specifically, we have exceptional Airmen and it's especially challenging to be selected for Airman of the Year," said Col. Christopher Sigler, 167th AW commander. "When you have strong Airmen coming into the wing and a strong chief force mentoring the young Airmen, it's a great dynamic and we have a winning team."

Airman 1st Class Barney's accomplishments include the coordination of 25 operational missions, 116 local training missions and over 500 simulator events while serving as an interim operations scheduler. As a loadmaster, he flew 186 hours on 62 sorties, transporting 236 tons of cargo and 226 passengers, playing a critical role in high impact operational missions.

Recently promoted to master sergeant, Barb was the West Virginia Air National Guard's representative for the Secretary of the Air Force's international affairs office and played a key role in the diplomatic relations with Gabon, West Virginia National Guard's newest State Partnership Program partner. Additionally, he advocated for the ranks of E-6 and below for the career enlisted aviator grade review which secured appropriate rank structures for 2,900 aviators.

Master Sgt. Church, who is currently serving overseas, was recognized for outstanding leadership and operational efficiency in her dual role as the services superintendent and installation personnel readiness non-commissioned officer in charge. She processed more than 300 members for critical missions while leading a flight of 25 Airmen. She oversaw wing dining facility repairs and upgrades and managed the lodging budget, securing accommodations for 1,300 personnel.

"Airmen, you're upholding the standard of professionalism," Sigler said, "and you set a high bar. Thank you for all you do to support the mission."



As UDM, Robinson recently prepared 13 members of the force support squadron with their readiness and out-processing for deployment, while she also completed the non-commissioned officer academy course.



Electrical Safety Around Water

To stay safe around pools, hot tubs, and spas:

- Hire a qualified electrician for safe wiring.
- Use covered outdoor outlets to keep them dry.
- Install and test Ground-Fault Circuit Interrupters (GFCIs) monthly to prevent shocks.
- Keep electrical devices at least 6 feet from water—opt for batterypowered items when possible.
- Never handle electrical devices while wet.
- Ensure power lines are safely positioned over pools and diving boards.
- Stay out of the water during storms.
- Schedule regular electrical inspections.
- Know how to shut off power in emergencies.

Electrocution is deadly, and wet skin or surfaces increase the risk. Signs of electrical shock in water include tingling, muscle cramps, and paralysis. If someone is being shocked, turn off the power but do not enter the water—use a non-conductive rescue tool and call 9-1-1 immediately.

Shelter-in-place (SIP) / Lockdown / Storm Shelter



Shelter-in-Place - Use Designated SIP location

- Use: Hazmat and CBRN shelter up to 3 hours. Protects personnel from heavier vapors that accumulate at lowest elevation (ex. Chlorine gas).
- Recommended location: Room on the highest floor of the building with limited windows



Lockdown

- Use: Active Shooter incident
- Recommended location: An enclosed room with lockable door and covered windows is ideal.



Storm Shelter - Use designated location

- Use: Protection in severe weather (ex. Tornado).
- Recommended location: Lowest floor, innermost room with limited windows/bay doors.

SAFE AND SECURE

Antiterrorism & Force Protection - Travel Security

These tips address travel security. One time when complacency can get us in trouble is when we travel. Here are a few tips that will increase your security the next time you go TDY, leave, or PCS to an OCONUS location.

- Avoid using military style bags such as A-3, B-4 or duffel bags, unless traveling Military Air.

- Remove all military logos, patches and stickers from your luggage.

- Ensure your luggage tag doesn't show your rank or military address.

- Travel in conservative civilian clothing when using commercial transportation or when traveling military airlift if you are connecting with a flight at a commercial terminal in a high risk area.

- Don't wear distinct military items such as organizational shirts, caps or issued shoes or glasses.

- Wear a long sleeved shirt if you have a visible U.S. affiliated tattoo.

- Remember to be aware of your surroundings, be suspicious and don't become the target.

- Do not use rank or duty title when registering in a hotel (if possible)

- If staying in same hotel for extended period of time, try to change rooms

- Try to get a room on the 2nd to 6th floors

- Ensure room is locked and valuables are secured (e.g., safe, take them with you)

REMEMBER: Antiterrorism and Force Protection is EVERYONE'S job.

COMBATING TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS U.S. Department of Defense



STOP Human Trafficking

Force, fraud, or coercion to compel a person to provide labor, services, or commercial sex.

Victims come from all backgrounds and can be women, men, and children.

Any minor (under 18 years of age) involved in commercial sex is a victim of human trafficking.

Recognize SIGNS

Physical/Environmental Indicators include signs of abuse, no identification, confined to worksite.

Psychological/Behavioral Indicators include submissive, anxious, lack of free will.
