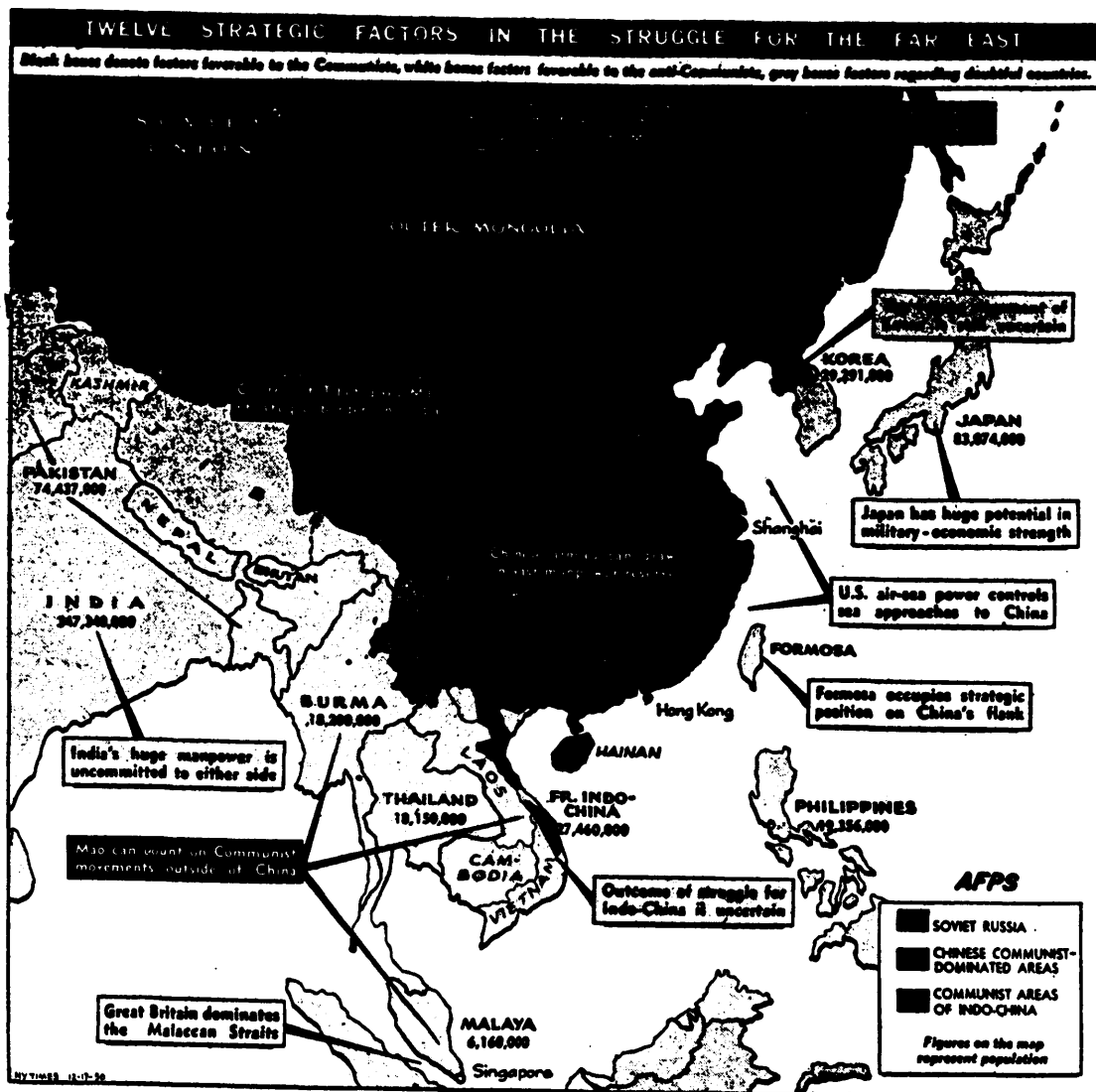

Yank in Korea Speaks a Piece On UN Unity

With the 2nd Infantry Division, Korea (AFPS) — Sgt. Richard Morgan, 31, wanted to tell the world about the help ROK soldiers gave him and his men when they were wounded in a tank ambush not long ago.

The sergeant, whose wife and daughter live at 2508 Naples Ave., Venice, Calif., was vehement.

"People back home have heard we don't get along with the Korean GIs. Hogwash! If it hadn't been for one of their outfits, I don't think a whole truckload of wounded Americans would have been here today."

He told a story of how he and 17 other wounded men, six of them litter cases, were "freezing to death" in open two-and-one-half ton trucks on their way to the rear in sub-zero cold.

"We stopped at an ROK aid station, and asked if they had any ambulances. You'da' thought we were doing them a favor. They loaded us into three nice warm ambulances and drove us all the rest of the way."

Morgan said he wished he had some way of "really thanking the ROKs."

"They were so damned gentle with us," he said.

"Let the guys at home ask the Chinks and the North Koreans if we don't stick together over here," he ended. "They've learned the hard way."

Los Angeles (AFPS) — Sada Gabriel, 44, divorced his wife because for 14 years after he moved here she wouldn't join him. She stayed in Chicago. When they were married, he was 7 and she was 5. Their marriage was performed according to the tenets of the Moslem religion in Iraq.

Worcester, Mass. (AFPS) — Albert Ricard knocked on a door and asked the man for a cigarette. The door was that of the county jail. The man who answered was a guard. Ricard was arrested as a suspect in a Fitchburg robbery when he was recognized by the guard.

National Guard Units Alerted

Washington (AFPS) — Two of the six National Guard Divisions in active service have been alerted for duty in Japan, the Defense Department announced recently. They are the Fortieth Infantry Division, of California, and the Forty-fifth Infantry Division, of Oklahoma. They are scheduled for movement to the Far East in March.

The Defense Department announcement said the two Divisions were being sent to Japan to "provide additional security for that country."

The four other Divisions in active service are the Twenty-Eighth, of Pennsylvania; the Forty-Third, of Vermont-Connecticut-Rhode Island; the Thirty-First of Alabama-Mississippi; and the Forty-Seventh, of Minnesota-North Dakota.

New Model Arm To Help Navy With Needlework

Washington (AFPS) — A needled arm that doesn't flinch is being used by the Navy to teach military medical personnel how to insert a needle in the vein and other body tissue.

It's a synthetic piece of equipment recently invented by a Navy dentist who was "stabbed" eight times before a hospital corpsman could hit a vein in the doctor's arm in the process of taking a blood sample.

The inventor, Commander John V. Niiranen, DC, USN, demonstrated the device during a regular Pentagon press briefing. The training aid is a life-like reproduction of the inventor's forearm.

Question:

What Do Soldiers Take With Them On O'Seas Tour

Seattle, Wash. (AFPS) — The Seattle Port of Embarkation Troop Movement Division has developed what it believes to be the most practical list of clothing and equipment Servicemen should carry with them on embarking for overseas stations, and what should be stored in the ship's hold.

Here is what goes with the individual as he boards a transport:

Outer clothing, consisting of fatigue uniform, combat boots, field jacket with hood, cotton field cap, O.D. field overcoat, pistol cartridge belt, first aid packet, and canteen.

The Serviceman also retains with him his weapon, sleeping bag, two cotton drawers, two cotton undershirts, one wool undershirt, one wool shirt, one pair O.D. wool trousers, three pair wool socks, one muffler, one poncho, one pair leather gloves, one pair wool insert gloves, handkerchiefs, toilet articles, and mess gear.

All other gear is packed in the duffel bag and stored in the hold.

1. EMPLOYEE "A" STARTED WORK AUG. 28, 1950. A. ANNUAL LEAVE EARNED IN 1950---9½ DAYS. B. ANNUAL LEAVE EARNED IN 1951 (TO DATE)---4 DAYS.

THE 9½ DAYS EARNED IN 1950 MUST BE USED BY JUNE 30. ANNUAL LEAVE EARNED SO FAR IN 1951 PLUS FURTHER LEAVE EARNED IN 1951 NEED NOT BE USED. HOWEVER IT MAY BE USED IF DESIRED, WITH THE APPROVAL OF THE SUPERVISOR.

2. EMPLOYEE "B" HAS BEEN WORKING FOR THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT FOR SEVERAL YEARS, EITHER AT ANOTHER INSTALLATION OR AT THIS ONE. A. ANNUAL LEAVE UNUSED ON DEC. 31, 1949---25 DAYS. B. ANNUAL LEAVE EARNED IN 1950---26 DAYS. C. ANNUAL LEAVE EARNED IN 1951 (TO DATE)---4 DAYS.

THE 26 DAYS EARNED IN 1950 MUST BE USED BY JUNE 30. ANNUAL LEAVE EARNED SO FAR IN 1951 PLUS FURTHER LEAVE EARNED IN 1951 AND LEAVE ACCRUED PRIOR TO 1950 NEED NOT BE USED. HOWEVER IT MAY BE USED IF DESIRED, WITH THE APPROVAL OF THE SUPERVISORS.

3. EMPLOYEE "C" HAS BEEN WORKING FOR THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT FOR SEVERAL YEARS. A. ANNUAL LEAVE UNUSED DEC. 31, 1949---45 DAYS. B. ANNUAL LEAVE EARNED IN 1950---26 DAYS. C. ANNUAL LEAVE EARNED IN 1951 (TO DATE)

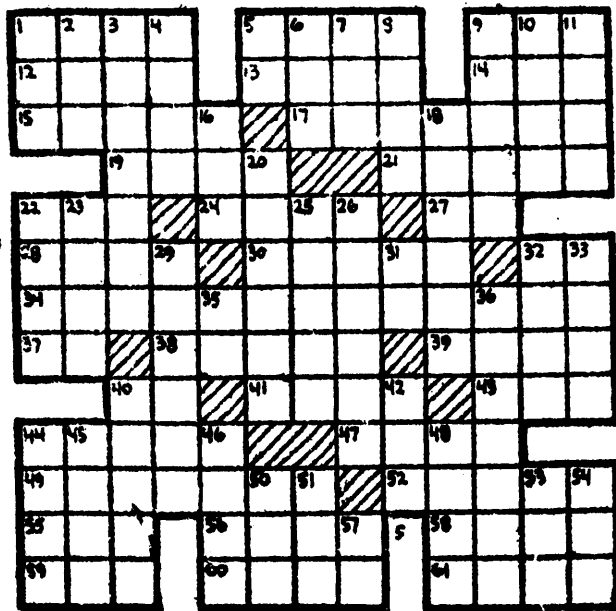

THE 26 DAYS EARNED IN 1950 MUST BE USED BY JUNE 30. THE 60-DAY RULE MUST ALSO BE COMPLIED WITH, WHICH STATES THAT NOT MORE THAN 60 DAYS ANNUAL LEAVE MAY BE CARRIED OVER AT THE END OF ANY CALENDAR YEAR. THEREFORE 11 DAYS EARNED IN 1950 SHOULD HAVE BEEN USED BY DEC. 31, 1950, AND THE REMAINING 15 DAYS EARNED IN 1950 MUST BE USED BY JUNE 30, 1951.

THE TROOP INFORMATION PROGRAM INCREASES UNDERSTANDING BY PROVIDING THE MOST ESSENTIAL FACTS TO ALL PERSONNEL TO HELP THEM RECOGNIZE AND UNDERSTAND THEIR MAIN OBJECTIVE.

THE ARMY EDUCATION PROGRAM PROVIDES MILITARY PERSONNEL WITH ACADEMIC AND VOCATIONAL EDUCATION OF THE TYPE AVAILABLE IN CIVILIAN SCHOOLS UP TO THE LEVEL OF COLLEGE GRADUATE.

THE COMMAND CONFERENCE (FORMERLY CALLED TROOP INFORMATION HOUR), IS ONE OF THE MAIN WAYS OF GETTING PERTINENT INFORMATION TO THE LARGEST NUMBER OF TROOPS. THE SUBJECT IS USUALLY A TIMELY ONE, WITH A SHORT NEWS SUMMARY AND A QUESTION AND ANSWER PERIOD. CURRENT ARMED FORCES TALKS ARE THE MAIN SOURCE OF INFORMATION USED IN COMMAND CONFERENCES. MOST UNIT DAY ROOMS HAVE A DISPLAY OF INFORMATION POSTERS. THE REAL MCCOY ANSWERS MANY QUESTIONS FOR MEN ON THE POST.

THE POST I & E SECTION IS CARRYING ON AN EXTENSIVE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM IN AN ATTEMPT TO RAISE THE ACADEMIC EDUCATIONAL LEVEL OF MILITARY PERSONNEL.

ONE MAN HAS TAKEN AND SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETED THE INTERMEDIATE ACHIEVEMENT TESTS AND HAS BEEN AWARDED HIS EIGHTH GRADE CERTIFICATE.

APPROXIMATELY TWO HUNDRED MEN HAVE TAKEN THE HIGH SCHOOL LEVEL GENERAL EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT TESTS, (GED TESTS). THESE

TESTS ARE DESIGNED TO MEASURE THE EQUIVALENT OF A HIGH SCHOOL EDUCATION IN CASES WHERE A SOLDIER HAS NOT COMPLETED HIGH SCHOOL, BUT HAS HAD SOME EDUCATIONAL EXPERIENCE SINCE LEAVING HIGH SCHOOL. MOST HIGH SCHOOLS WILL GRANT A DIPLOMA ON THE BASIS OF SUCCESSFUL COMPLETION OF THE GED TESTS.

COLLEGE LEVEL GED TESTS ARE USED TO MEASURE INDIVIDUAL STUDY OR EXPERIENCE ABOVE HIGH SCHOOL LEVEL. UP TO THE EQUIVALENT OF ONE YEAR OF COLLEGE CREDIT MAY BE ENTERED ON A SOLDIER'S MILITARY PERSONNEL RECORD FOR THE COLLEGE LEVEL GED TESTS.

THE POST I & E OFFICE NOW OFFERS "OVER-THE-COUNTER" REGISTRATION SERVICE FOR SELF-STUDY CORRESPONDENCE COURSES THROUGH USAFI. THESE COURSES ARE AVAILABLE TO ALL MEN ON ACTIVE DUTY. MEN IN TECHNICAL JOBS MAY SIGN UP FOR COURSES TO INCREASE THEIR PROFICIENCY IN THEIR PARTICULAR FIELD AND HELP THEIR CHANCE FOR PROMOTION. SOME MEN PREFER TO TAKE COURSES THAT WILL HELP THEM TO GET A FINER JOB IN CIVILIAN LIFE. IN THIS WAY THEY MAKE VALUABLE USE OF THEIR SPARE TIME WHILE IN THE ARMY.

A SURVEY IS UNDER WAY TO DETERMINE POTENTIAL ENROLLMENT IN GROUP STUDY CLASSES.

CLASSES IN LITERATURE, AMERICAN HISTORY, AMERICAN GOVERNMENT, SPOKEN LANGUAGES INCLUDING GERMAN, SPANISH, ITALIAN, RUSSIAN, AND FRENCH, WILL PROBABLY BE OFFERED, DEPENDING ON DEMAND FOR THESE SUBJECTS.

THE I & E SCHOOL NOW OFFERS THE FORTY-HOUR DISCUSSION LEADER'S COURSE EACH WEEK FOR TRAINING UNIT DISCUSSION LEADERS. THE OBJECT IS TO HAVE TWO PER CENT OF THE PERSONNEL IN ALL UNITS TRAINED IN THE TECHNIQUES OF LEADING A DISCUSSION.

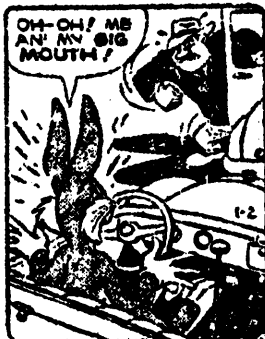

A MESSAGE BY LT. GEN. MATTHEW B. RIDGWAY . . .

"TIME FOR DEFENSE"

THE FOLLOWING RECORDED STATEMENT BY LT. GEN. MATTHEW B. RIDGWAY, COMMANDING GENERAL, EIGHTH ARMY, WAS BROADCAST ON THE DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE RADIO PROGRAM, "TIME FOR DEFENSE" OVER THE AMERICAN BROADCASTING COMPANY NETWORK ON JAN. 25:

"IN MY BRIEF PERIOD OF COMMAND DUTY HERE I HAVE HEARD FROM SEVERAL SOURCES, CHIEFLY FROM THE MEMBERS OF COMBAT UNITS, THE QUESTION, 'WHY ARE WE HERE?', 'WHAT ARE WE FIGHTING FOR?'

"WHAT FOLLOWS REPRESENTS MY ANSWERS TO THOSE QUESTIONS.

"THE ANSWER TO THE FIRST QUESTION, 'WHY ARE WE HERE?', IS SIMPLE AND CONCLUSIVE. WE ARE HERE BECAUSE OF THE DECISIONS OF THE PROPERLY CONSTITUTED AUTHORITIES OF OUR RESPECTIVE GOVERNMENTS. AS THE COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF, UNITED NATIONS COMMAND, GENERAL OF THE ARMY DOUGLAS MACARTHUR SAID PUBLICLY YESTERDAY: 'THIS COMMAND INTENDS TO MAINTAIN A MILITARY POSITION IN KOREA JUST AS LONG AS THE STATESMEN OF THE UNITED NATIONS DECIDE WE SHOULD DO SO.' THE ANSWER IS SIMPLE BECAUSE FURTHER COMMENT IS

UNNECESSARY. IT IS CONCLUSIVE BECAUSE THE LOYALTY WE GIVE, AND EXPECT, PRECLUDES ANY SLIGHTEST QUESTIONING OF THOSE ORDERS.

"THE SECOND QUESTION IS OF MUCH GREATER SIGNIFICANCE, EVERY MEMBER OF THIS COMMAND IS ENTITLED TO FULL AND REASONED ANSWER. MINE FOLLOWS:

"TO ME THE ISSUES ARE CLEAR. IT IS NOT A QUESTION OF THIS OR THAT KOREAN TOWN OR VILLAGE. REAL ESTATE IS, HERE, INCIDENTAL. IT IS NOT RESTRICTED TO THE ISSUE OF FREEDOM FOR OUR SOUTH KOREAN ALLIES, WHOSE FIDELITY AND VALOR UNDER THE SEVEREST STRESSES OF BATTLE WE RECOGNIZE; THOUGH THAT FREEDOM IS A SYMBOL OF THE WIDER ISSUES, AND INCLUDED AMONG THEM.

"THE REAL ISSUES ARE WHETHER OR NOT THE POWER OF WESTERN CIVILIZATION, AS GOD HAS PERMITTED IT TO FLOWER IN OUR OWN BELOVED LANDS, SHALL DEFY AND DEFEAT COMMUNISM; WHETHER THE RULE OF MEN WHO SHOOT THEIR PRISONERS AND ENSLAVE THEIR CITIZENS, AND DERIDE THE DIGNITY OF MAN, SHALL DISPLACE THE RULE OF THOSE TO WHOM THE INDIVIDUAL AND HIS INDIVIDUAL RIGHTS ARE SACRED; WHETHER WE ARE TO SURVIVE WITH GOD'S HAND TO GUIDE AND LEAD US, OR TO PERISH IN THE DEAD EXISTENCE OF A GODLESS WORLD.

"IF THESE BE TRUE, AND TO ME THEY ARE, BEYOND ANY POSSIBILITY OF CHALLENGE, THEN THIS HAS LONG SINCE CEASED TO BE A FIGHT FOR FREEDOM FOR OUR KOREAN ALLIES ALONE, AND FOR THEIR

NATIONAL SURVIVAL. IT HAS BECOME, AND IT CONTINUES TO BE, A FIGHT FOR OUR OWN FREEDOM, FOR OUR OWN SURVIVAL, IN AN HONORABLE, INDEPENDENT NATIONAL EXISTENCE.

"THE SACRIFICES WE HAVE MADE, AND THOSE WE SHALL YET SUPPORT, ARE NOT OFFERED VICARIOUSLY FOR OTHERS, BUT IN OUR OWN DIRECT DEFENSE, WHEREIN CERTAIN PRINCIPLES MEAN MORE THAN LIFE.

"IN THE FINAL ANALYSIS, THE ISSUE NOW JOINED RIGHT HERE IN KOREA IS WHETHER COMMUNISM OR INDIVIDUAL FREEDOM SHALL PREVAIL AND, MAKE NO MISTAKE, WHETHER THE NEXT FLIGHT OF FEAR-DRIVEN PEOPLE WE HAVE JUST WITNESSED ACROSS THE HAN RIVER, AND CONTINUE TO WITNESS IN OTHER AREAS, SHALL BE CHECKED AND DEFEATED OVERSEAS OR PERMITTED, STEP BY STEP, TO CLOSE IN ON OUR OWN HOME LANDS AND AT SOME FUTURE TIME, HOWEVER DISTANT, TO ENGULF OUR OWN LOVED ONES IN ALL ITS MISERY AND DESPAIR.

"THESE ARE THINGS FOR WHICH WE FIGHT. NEVER HAVE MEMBERS OF ANY MILITARY COMMAND HAD A GREATER CHALLENGE THAN WE, OR A FINER OPPORTUNITY TO SHOW OURSELVES AND OUR PEOPLE AT THEIR BEST AND THUS BE AN HONOR TO THE PROFESSION OF ARMS, AND A CREDIT TO THOSE WHO BRED US.

"I WOULD LIKE EACH COMMANDER TO WHOM THIS IS ADDRESSED, IN HIS OWN CHOSEN WAYS OF LEADERSHIP, TO CONVEY THE SUBSTANCE OF THIS MESSAGE TO EVERY SINGLE MEMBER OF HIS COMMAND, AND AT THE EARLIEST PRACTICABLE MOMENT."
