Anti-smoking policy implemented

Senior leadership wants smoking the exception-not the rule

A new anti-smoking policy that took place July 7 bans smoking in all Army-occupied areas except those specifically designated for smokers.

Provisions under the Army regulation 1-8, "Smoking in Department of the Army Occupied Buildings and Facilities," apply to all vehicles, aircraft, offices, buildings and facilities over which the Army has control.

Space assigned to the Army by the General Services Administration is also included.

Army officials expect to enhance readiness through the policy by establishing the standard of a smoke-free environment. The senior leadership hopes to cause a mind-shift within the Army to think that "smoking is the exception—not the rule."

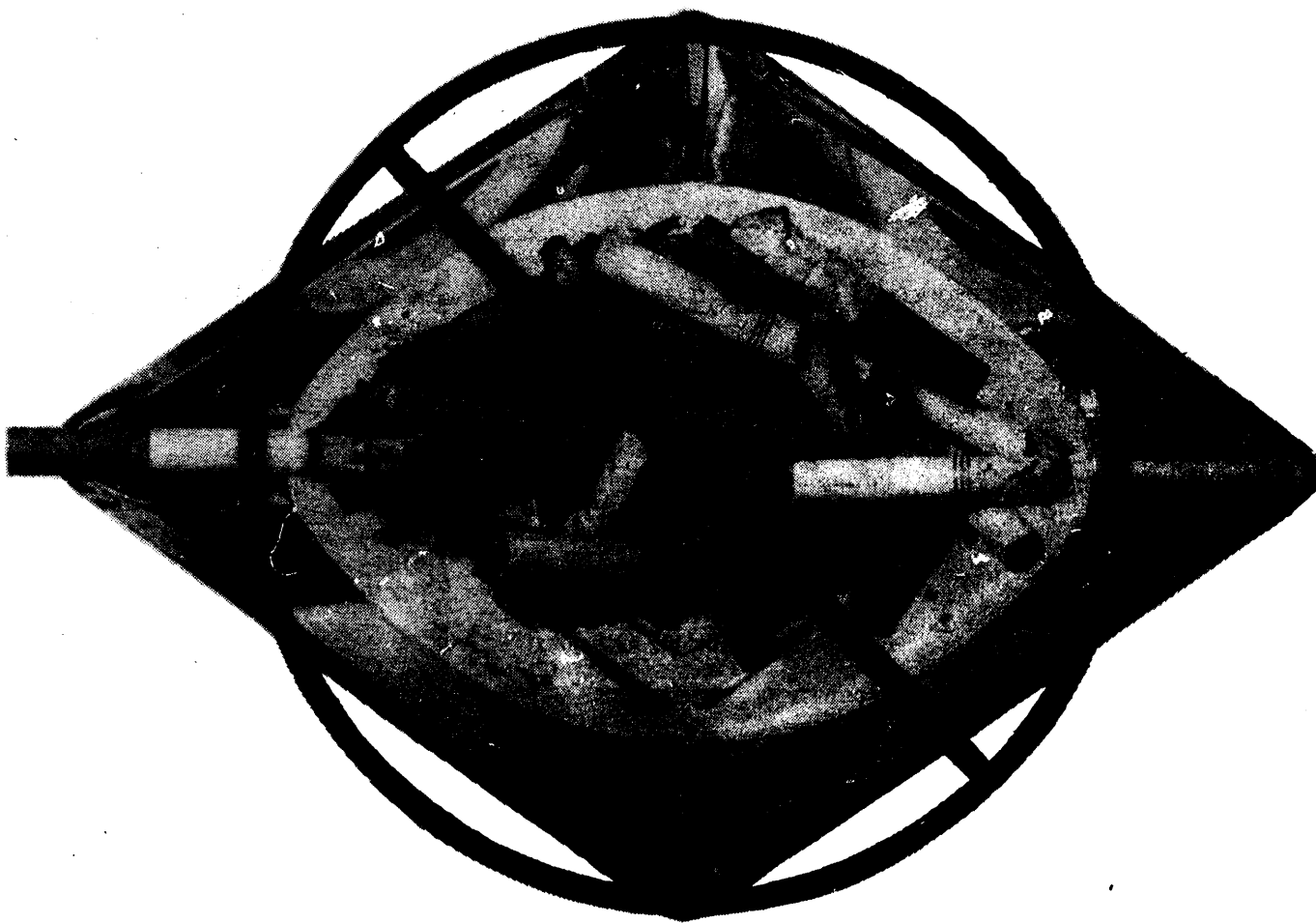
Studies have shown that smoking reduces readiness by impairing physical fitness and by increasing illness, absenteeism, premature death and health care costs, according to the Army leadership.

The 1985 Defense Department Worldwide Report on Cigarette Use by Military Personnel shows that 52 percent of the Army's 778,000 soldiers smoke, as compared to about 30 percent in the general public.

The intent of the policy, developed by the major Army commands and Army headquarters, is, "to protect non-smokers and to encourage smokers to quit," said Maj. Jim Paige, a project officer with the Army's Leadership Division at the Pentagon.

The policy doesn't attempt to completely prohibit smoking. It provides for smokers by allowing commanders and agency supervisors to designate smoking areas, when possible, "to avoid undue inconvenience to persons who desire to smoke." Such designated smoking areas, however, must be confined to those places where the second-hand smoke can be sufficiently isolated to protect non-smokers from its effects.

Conference rooms and other areas already designated as no-smoking areas under AR 1-8 will retain that status,



according to the policy. Supervisors or commanders may not designate smoking areas within auditoriums, conference rooms, restrooms, gymnasiums, fitness centers and elevators.

The policy is broadly written to allow local commanders to develop their own policies tailored to their unit or installation. "If the policy were more specific, it would be too dictatorial," Paige said. "The commanders can set their own standards within the policy's guidelines, using a common sense approach."

According to Maj. Lawrence Rich, director of the Directorates of Personnel and Community Activities, the policy at Fort McCoy will be enforced by each directorate on post.

The policy does provide specifics for enforcement in some areas, however. It specifies, for example, that smoking areas in dining facilities and other eating areas "shall be permitted only if adequate space

is available for non-smoking patrons and ventilation is adequate to provide them a healthy environment."

The policy for clubs, restaurants, recreational, and other such facilities on Fort McCoy will be determined on a case-by-case basis by Rich.

It also addresses living areas. When individual living quarters are not available and two or more individuals are assigned to one room, smoking and non-smoking preferences shall be considered.

Smoking by health care providers in front of patients, even while in a designated smoking area, is prohibited under the policy, too. Likewise, faculty, staff and visiting parents may not smoke in the presence or view of children in Department of Defense Dependent Schools and child development centers. Students may never smoke on school grounds.

Notices at the entrances to Army-occupied space will indicate that smoking

is prohibited except in specifically designated areas. Signs will also indicate those areas designated for smoking.

Furthermore, ashtrays are not permitted in non-smoking areas unless placed at doorways so that smokers can put out their cigarettes, cigars or pipes before entering.

Soldiers, Army civilians and contractor personnel who violate the policy face administrative action. Other violators could be removed from or denied access to Army-occupied buildings.

Tobacco smokers usually won't be punished under the Uniform Code of Military Justice, however, unless soldiers disobey a lawful order or regulation restricting smoking, and also pose a threat to safety or security, or knowingly disregard the health and comfort of others.

The use of smokeless tobacco will be less restricted but will be prohibited in

Marsh, Wickham clear air

WASHINGTON—In recently issued proclamation, Secretary of the Army John O. Marsh Jr. and Army Chief of Staff John A. Wickham Jr. emphasize eliminating tobacco use among soldiers. Here is the text of the proclamation:

"The readiness and well-being of total Army members and their families challenge us to deal with the problem of tobacco use. Medical evidence shows overwhelmingly that the use of tobacco products adversely impacts on the health and readiness of our force. Tobacco usage impairs such critical military skills as night vision, hand-eye coordination, and resistance to

cold weather injuries. Moreover, it increases susceptibility to disease. It has become a substantial threat to the well-being of our Army, and we must take immediate steps to eliminate its usage.

Every Army member is charged to make this goal a reality. All of us have a clear responsibility in making this happen. As part of the Army tobacco cessation action plan, we will encourage smokers to quit through a program of education, information, and assistance. We will also safeguard the health of smokers and nonsmokers alike by limiting the areas in which smoking will be

permitted. Finally, we will check on all forms of tobacco usage from time to time to determine progress in meeting our goal. We believe this campaign is absolutely essential to maintain the health and readiness of our Army.

Ours is a profession unique in many respects, requiring physical fitness and stamina to get the job done. Each of us must be ready physically to endure the strains of a crisis. Additionally, caring leadership dictates that we demonstrate a sincere, unambiguous concern for the health and safety of those entrusted to our care."

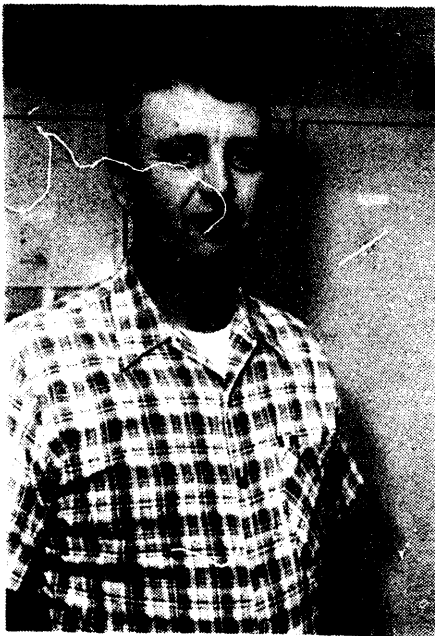
"What do you think of the Army's new policy on smoking?"



Mary Stiehl, ARRTC—"I think it is a good idea. But they should have a designated break area for the smokers to go, and for non-smokers to use at their own discretion."



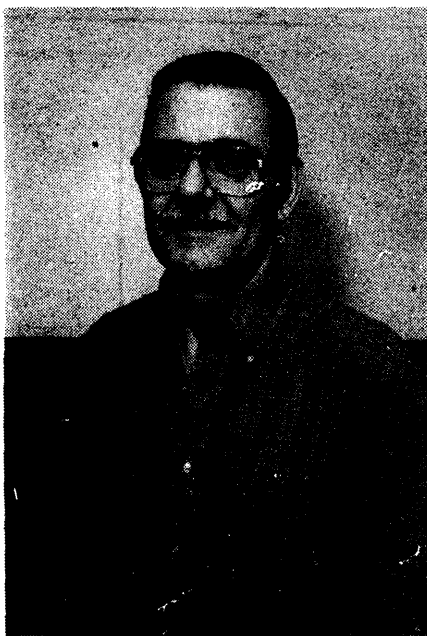
SFC William Hollihan, ARRTC—"We have waited so long to do something that we are probably over reacting. But it is long overdue."



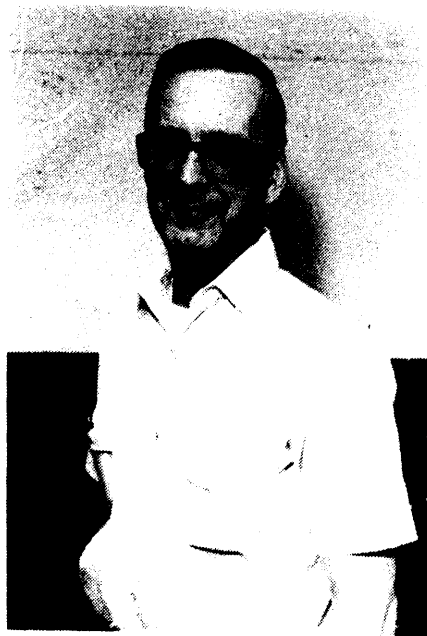

public areas such as auditoriums, conference rooms, classrooms, dining or food preparation areas, military vehicles, tactical vehicles and aircraft.

Smokeless tobacco will be permitted in private offices or in individual work areas except when the use is meeting with patients or clients or when conducting any kind of interview. Users will be required to provide their own spittoons and will be expected to keep them clean

and out of general view. When users and nonusers room together, chewing and dipping will not be permitted.

Smoking cessation programs and support groups for smokers are being established Army-wide to help them overcome the need to smoke.

According to Rich, it's a probability that classes will be offered on post in the near future. ArNews

Funds available for law school

WASHINGTON—The Office of the Army Judge Advocate General in Washington, D.C., is now accepting applications for the annual Funded Legal Education Program.

The program can send up to 10 active duty junior officers to law school at government expense. Officers selected remain on active duty while attending three years of law school and incur a six-year service obligation following the completion of the course.

The program is open to officers in the ranks of second lieutenant through

captain with at least two but no more than six years of service at the time legal training begins, said Maj. Michelle A. Gary, assignment officer for the Office of the Judge Advocate General.

Interested officers should review Army Regulation 351-22 (the Judge Advocate General's Funded Legal Education Program) to determine their eligibility. Eligible officers should follow the application procedures in the program regulations. Completed applications must be sent through command channels to arrive at the Office of the Judge Advocate General by Nov. 1. ArNews

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Baltz named state's civilian aide

Walter F. Baltz III will be formally appointed as Wisconsin's Civilian Aide to the Secretary of the Army during an investiture ceremony at Heileman Hall in La Crosse tomorrow.

Baltz, a West Salem resident, is the general director of information systems at Heileman Brewery in La Crosse.

As a civilian aide, Baltz will represent the interests of all active and reserve Army components in Wisconsin, as well as serve as a liaison between the Army and the Wisconsin public.

Every two years, the Secretary of the Army appoints at least one prominent civilian leader from each state, the District of Columbia, the commonwealth of Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands to serve as an aide.

Some of the duties of a civilian aide include advising the Secretary of the Army, the Army Chief of Staff and other major commanders on public attitudes toward the Army within the state where the aide resides.

Recommending actions which should be taken to broaden public understanding of the Army and its personnel, disseminating information about the objective,

role, requirements and major action programs of the Army, recommending and assisting as to ways and means of attaining the maximum understanding and cooperation between the civilian community and the Army and of encouraging mutual appreciation of the needs and problems of each, are also duties of a civilian aide.

When the Secretary of the Army cannot personally attend military or civilian functions, the aide would be his representative.

"I accepted this position because I was asked to serve in whatever capacity I can," Baltz said. "If I believe in something strongly, I get involved. I hope, in some fashion, that I might assist the Department of the Army in getting its message out to the people of Wisconsin and, as I become more aware of cogent information, report back to Secretary of the Army, John O. Marsh," Baltz said.

Col. Bill Sorenson, Fort McCoy garrison commander, was pleased with the appointment of Baltz.

"I am personally delighted that someone nearer to Fort McCoy has been appointed because we are the only active federal installation in the State," he said.

"This is the first time a civilian aide has not been from the Madison or Milwaukee area, he continued.

"I have some knowledge of the military based on heritage and experience," Baltz explained.

"The military is no stranger to me or my family. My great-great-grandfather fought in the Prussian Army in Germany, my great grandfather in the Civil War, my grandfather at San Juan Hill, my father in Korea and my younger brother in Vietnam." Baltz served in the military from 1950 to 1953 and said this military background will help him in adjusting quickly to the duties required of a civilian aide.

Baltz was raised in West Salem. He later attended the University of Wisconsin in Madison where he earned a bachelor of science degree in history.

Married for 24 years, Baltz and his wife Ann Marie reside in West Salem. The couple has three children.

Baltz is active in community affairs, including the American Legion, the La Crosse Chamber of Commerce, the National Rifle Association and the University of Wisconsin Alumni Association to name a few. He also served on the West Salem Village Council in 1975.



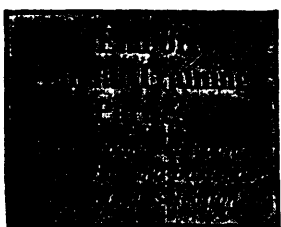

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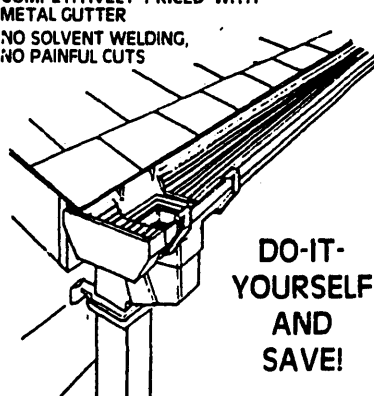

FORSCOM gets new commander

Palastra succeeds Sennewald

FORT MCPHERSON, Ga.—Gen. Joseph T. Palastra, Jr., 54, took command of U.S. Army Forces Command (FORSCOM) during June 25 ceremonies here.

Gen. Robert W. Sennewald, 56, commanding FORSCOM since June 18, 1984, retired after more than 35 years of active duty service. Gen. John A. Wickham, Jr., Army Chief of Staff, presided over the change of command ceremonies.

FORSCOM, the largest command in the Army, controls active-duty and reserve units at 20 major Army installations located across 49 states (every state but Hawaii), as well as the commonwealth of Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands of the United States.

If ordered to active federal service during a full national mobilization, Army National Guard units in those 49 states

also would become part of FORSCOM, bringing the total strength of the command to more than 950,000 soldiers, almost two-thirds of the U.S. Army's total ground combat forces. It is for that reason that FORSCOM is known as "the strategic reserve of land forces for the free world."

Palastra comes to FORSCOM after commanding I Corps and its headquarters installation, Fort Lewis, Wash., since July 3, 1984.

A 1954 United States military academy graduate, Palastra also holds a master of business administration degree from Auburn University. A native of Portsmouth, N.H., he has served in a variety of tours overseas and in the United States during his 32 years of active duty, including a 1968-69 tour in Vietnam command-

ing the 1st Battalion, 12th Infantry, 4th Infantry Division.

His decorations and awards include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Distinguished Service Medal, the Silver Star, the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star with "V" Device for Valor and Two Oak Leaf Clusters, and eight Air Medals. Ranger-qualified, Palastra also wears the badges of a Combat Infantryman, Senior Army Aviator and Senior Parachutist.

In recent years, Palastra has commanded an air assault brigade and mechanized infantry division. He also has served as senior military assistant to the Deputy Secretary of Defense and as Chief of Staff for United States Forces in the Republic of Korea. Some of Palastra's key assignments include a tour as deputy director for estimates for the Defense Intelligence Agency in Washington, D.C.; force struc-

ture analyst and special plans staff officer for Headquarters, Army Staff, in the Pentagon; deputy director international security policy, Politico Military Bureau at the Department of State; and deputy commander-in-chief and chief of staff of United States Pacific Command in Hawaii. Palastra is a graduate of the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College and the U.S. Air Force Air War College. He is married to the former Anne Rich. The Palastras have one son and four daughters.

A native of St. Louis, Mo., Sennewald is married to the former Nancy Jane Vance. The Sennewalds have three children, a son and two daughters. During the ceremony, Gen. Sennewald was awarded the first Oak Leaf Cluster to his Distinguished Service Medal by Gen. Wickham and Mrs. Sennewald was decorated for outstanding civilian service for her efforts in support of Army families.



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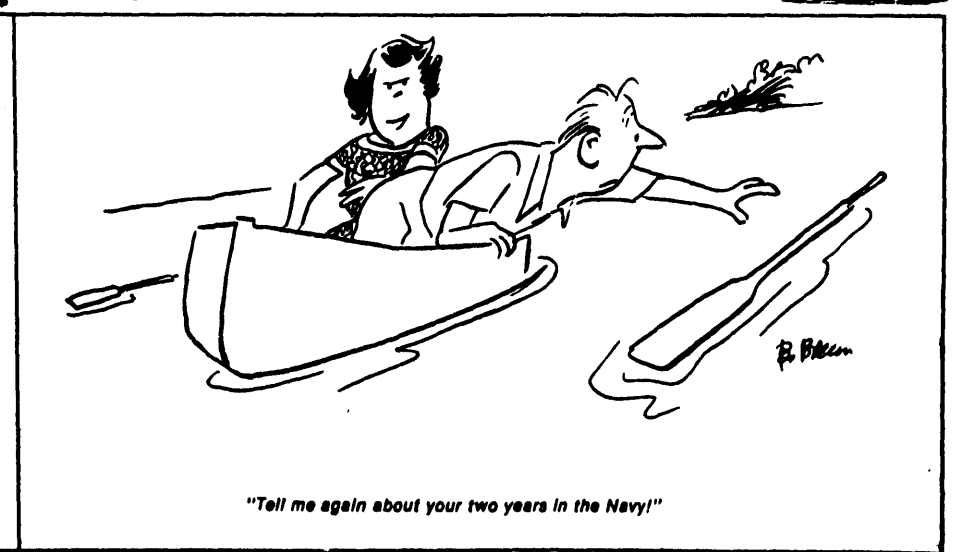
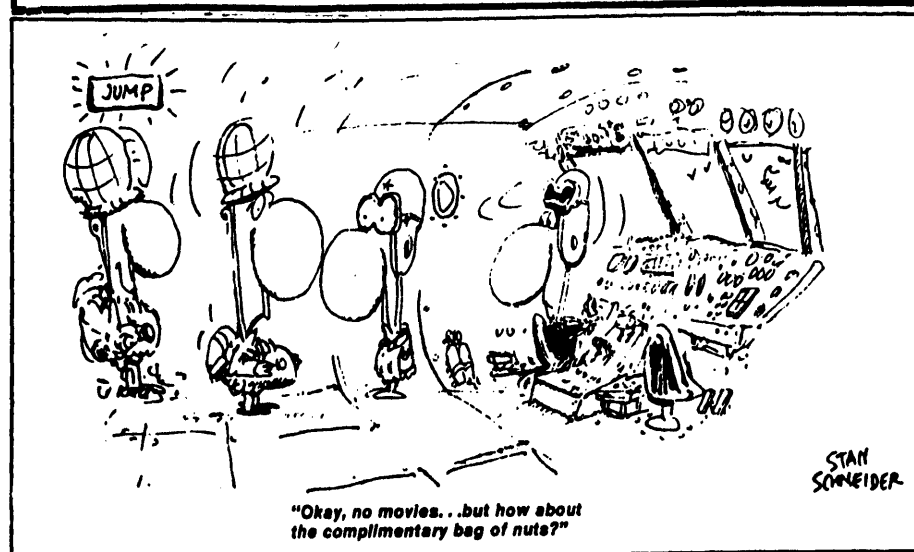

Combined service totals 80 years

Vancil, Bongard still enjoy work

The Directorate of Logistics at Fort McCoy now boasts two employees whose combined federal service totals 80 years. Cathy Vancil and Cal Bongard each recently received pins recognizing 40 years of service.

Vancil

Vancil, the installation transportation officer, began her career in 1945 as a clerk-typist at Chicago Quartermaster Base-Sub depot in Sparta.

Because the depot was scheduled to close, Vancil transferred to Fort McCoy until August of 1946. That December, she started as a property and supply clerk with transportation duties at Tomah's Veterans Administration Medical Center.

At the onset of the Korean War in 1950, she returned to Fort McCoy and has worked her way up gradually, becoming installation transportation officer in May of 1981.

Although she can retire at anytime, Vancil hopes to work at least another year.

"I enjoy my work and all the challenges that go with it," Vancil said.

As transportation officer, Vancil oversees transportation and traffic management functions and the supervision of the transportation motor pool. The transportation officer is also responsible for coordinating transportation for Reservists, National Guard members and Re-

serve Officer Training Corps members in the 4th Army area coming to McCoy for training. Travel arrangements for Army Reserve Readiness Training Center students are also made.

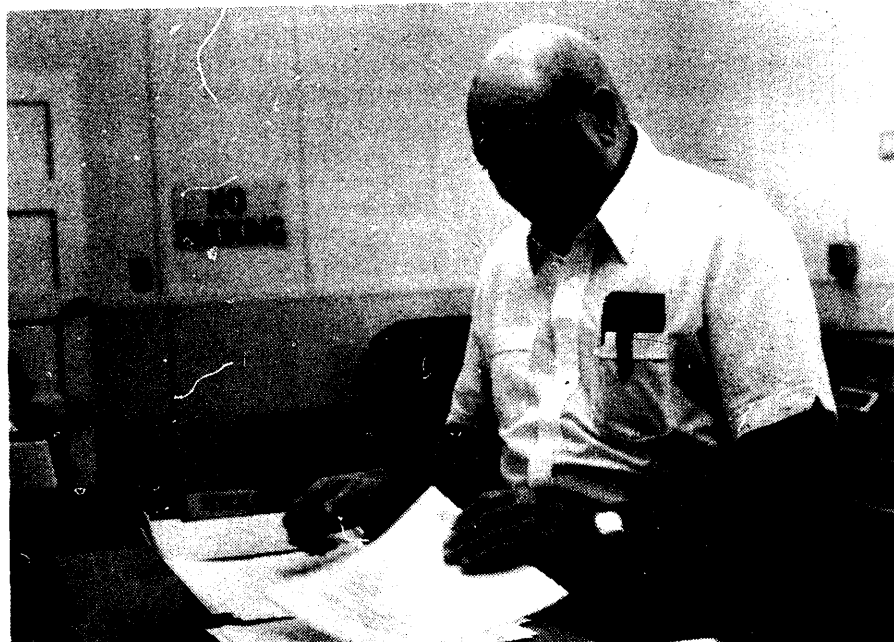
The most interesting aspect of her work is the wide variety of transportation functions she must plan and execute from moving individuals, to small or large groups of personnel and material in the continental United States or outside the United States by several different modes of shipment, such as train, ship or plane, Vancil said.

"The most challenging and interesting move during my career was the Return of Forces to Germany (REFORGER '86). It was the largest rail move for Fort McCoy. The overall coordination for air, rail and water transportation was enormous but very interesting," she continued.

During REFORGER '86, 354 rail cars transported 1,500 major pieces of military equipment to three shipping ports where they were loaded and sent to Europe.

Reflecting on her years of service, Vancil said, "I can't believe how fast 40 years went by. I can remember when troops used to march here for annual training. Now they arrive by truck or plane.

"When I first started here, they still had a potbellied stove for heat in building 1951. Now, if an office doesn't have a coffee pot or a refrigerator, what would people do?"

Bongard

Cal Bongard, chief of the property control branch, has also devoted 40 years of his life to government service.

His experience in helping people began in the Army when he was a supply warrant officer. Bongard began his military career in November, 1944 in Minneapolis for the 14th US Army Corps. His career spanned two decades and took him to the Philippines, Japan, Korea, Germany and various installations in the United States including a six-month stay at Fort McCoy in 1951.

After retiring, he worked for 20 months as a purchasing agent for a private company in Minneapolis. At that time, the opportunity to work for civil service arose. "I couldn't pass it up. The benefits and wages were better," he said. Bongard returned to his old job as a supply officer for the 14th US Army Corps in Minneapolis.

In 1970, Bongard transferred to Fort McCoy and in 1981 became the chief of the property control branch.

In his current position, Bongard directs the overall operation of providing supplies like petroleum, dry goods, field gear and ammunition to units training at Fort McCoy.

"One of the most interesting experiences of my work was the challenge to be able to support the entire 47th Viking Division during their annual training in 1984. The Division had 12,000 troops

from Illinois, Iowa and Minnesota. Indications were that supply was going to have problems but we heard nothing but praise for the supply department here. Everything went off without a hitch and figures came out right on the button when they left," he said. Thanks to some very competent personnel in the directorate, things went perfectly, Bongard said.

"Many times our office ends up being an information center. People are always saying, 'If you can't find it, ask Cal Bongard.' If I don't have it, I usually find out where it is and they ask me for everything under the sun," he said.

"Our office deals directly with the units to make sure their needs are met. We get 'thousands' of calls a day," he said.

"Cal goes above and beyond the call of duty," said Jan Williams, property control secretary. "Reservists come back to the office because they know they can get help from him."

"He really works for the people. He's always helping somebody," said Carol Wagner, a supply system analyst who works with Bongard.

Although he anticipates retiring at the end of August, Bongard said he may work until the beginning of next year.

For his co-workers, a postponement to his retirement would be good news.

"Cal always finds a solution. He's been just terrific," said Wagner.

"It's so hard to replace someone who is so knowledgeable," said Williams.

"In this job, you learn something every day," Bongard said.

Bongard and his wife Maxine live in Tomah and have four grown children and one grandson.

He also enjoys woodworking and fishing in his home state of Minnesota.

Office marks 20th anniversary

7 men serve as SMA since 1966

WASHINGTON—The Office of the Sergeant Major of the Army was created nearly 20 years ago to assist the Chief of Staff of the Army with matters pertaining to enlisted soldiers.

The function of the office is to provide a direct line of communications between enlisted soldiers in the field and top leaders of the Army.

It was established in July of 1966 by then Army Chief of Staff Gen. Harold K. Johnson as a result of recommendations made to him by Army sergeants major during their 1965 personnel conference.

The Sergeant Major of the Army (SMA) is responsible for professional development of the Non-Commissioned Officer Corps, maintaining high standards of conduct and appearance of all enlisted soldiers, and using the NCO support channel effectively. His responsibilities also include morale, welfare, training, clothing insignia, equipment, pay and allowances, customs and courtesies of the service, enlistment and re-enlistment, discipline, and promotion policies. The SMA is usually appointed to any board or commission that deals with enlisted soldiers.

When called upon to do so, the SMA testifies before congressional committees and sub-committees and travels throughout the world, visiting soldiers of the total Army. His speaking engagements range from small groups of soldiers in the field to hundreds of civilians and soldiers at ceremonies and special events.

The position of SMA was created on July 4, 1966, by General Order 34. The term of service, originally two years, was changed to three years by General Order 23 on Nov. 15, 1977.

The selection process for the SMA begins with a record review of all the serving senior command sergeants major by a board of generals and the incumbent SMA. From these, a list of five nominees is forwarded to the Chief of Staff, who makes the selection.

Previous SMAs have had diverse careers. The common denominator that runs throughout is that they have been combat arms command sergeants major with extensive troop leading experience. To date, all have had combat experience.

Seven men have held the position as the highest

ranking enlisted soldier in the Army since July 11, 1966, when the first SMA was sworn in during ceremonies conducted at the Pentagon.

William O. Woolridge, July 1966-August 1968. He is retired and writing a biography.

George W. Dunaway, September 1968-September 1970. He is retired.

Silas L. Copland, October 1970-June 1973. He is in real estate sales.

Leon L. Van Autreve, July 1973-June 1975. He is a representative for the Department of Defense on voting.

William G. Bainbridge, July 1975-June 1979. He is the director, Member Services, U.S. Soldiers' and Airmen's Home in Washington, D.C.

William A. Connelly, July 1979-June 1983. He is a special assistant to the director, Veterans Administration.

The present SMA, Glen E. Morrell, was sworn into office on July 1, 1983. His term of office will end June 30, 1987. ArNews

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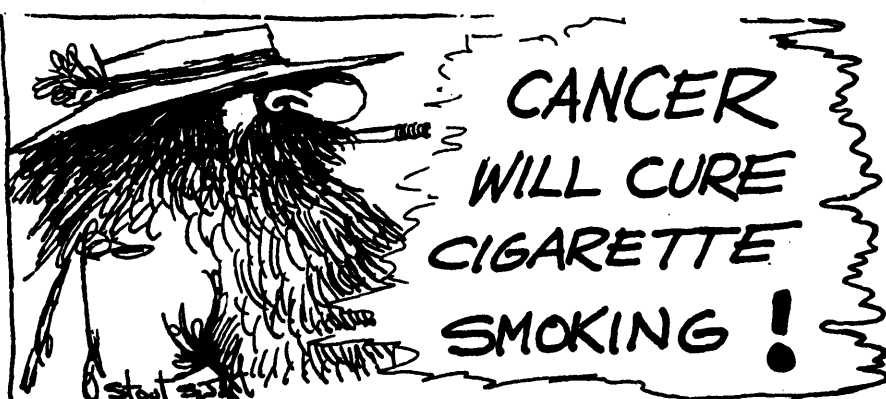
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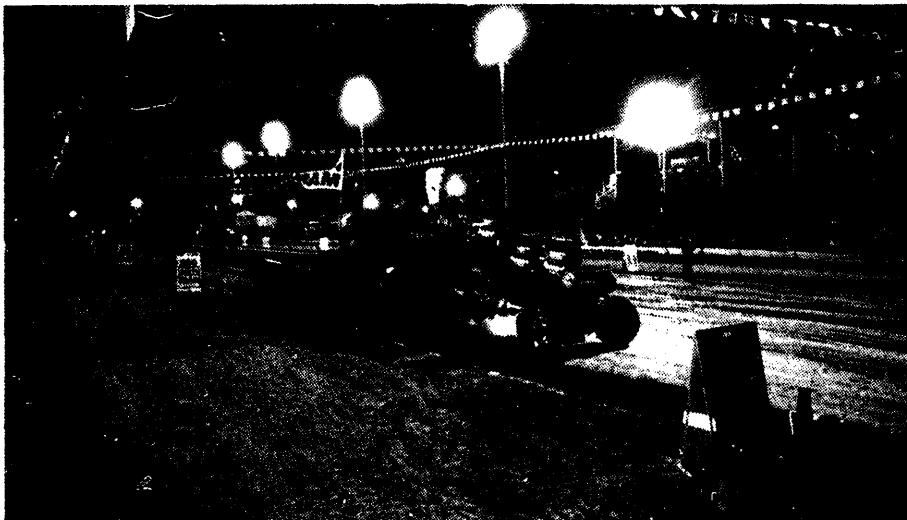
Tomah hosts national tractor pull

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Unit 'defends' airfield for training

Air superiority wins battles. In the air, a combat aircraft is a deadly and awesome fighting machine.

But on the ground, it's just another target.

The 79th Military Police Company, an Army Reserve unit from Rochester, Minn., is training at Fort McCoy, defending an airbase from enemy attack.

"The enemy could bomb the airfield, but we'd still have the use of it after it is repaired," said Capt. William Brenna, commander of the 79th. "For the enemy to capture it, they'll have to attack on the ground."

"That's when we go to work," Brenna added.

Brenna also explained that the Air Force used to be responsible for defending its own bases against ground attack, but the scope of the job of "defense in depth" was beyond Air Force capability.

"The Air Force security forces are still the close-in defenders of the air base," Brenna said. "But the Army will try to locate, attack, and destroy an enemy force before it gets close enough for the Air Force troops to engage."

"We'll have patrols out over an area

up to 20 kilometers around the air base," said 2nd Lt. Rick Kumlien, a platoon leader with the 79th. "Any enemy units in that area will be located and attacked by the MPs."

Kumlien also said that a military police patrol, equipped with rifles, machine guns, and grenade launchers, is a formidable force on its own, but it can also radio for help from other Army units.

"MPs are trained to direct artillery fire and air strikes," Kumlien said. "They can also radio for other nearby patrols to attack."

Kumlien is a full-time student majoring in recreation administration at the University of Wisconsin in La Crosse. He is from Janesville, Wis.

"This is a new mission for all of us," said Sgt. Jeffery Schmidt. "The biggest problem I see is the size of the area that we have to patrol—it's big."

Schmidt is a deputy sheriff in Black Hawk County, Iowa.

The 79th was deployed near the Fort McCoy airfield in the training exercise, according to 2nd Lt. Lori Ann Enfield, a platoon leader.

"An Air Force base would be somewhat larger," Enfield said, "But this pro-

vides enough realism to train soldiers.

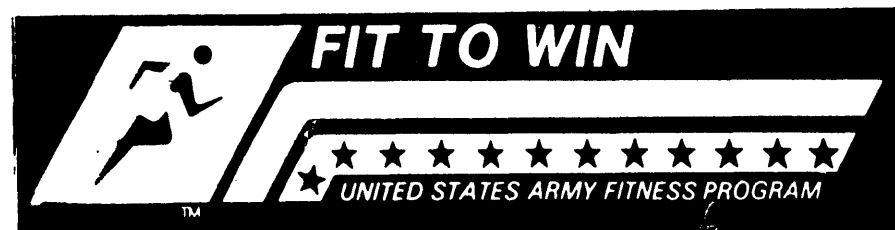
Enfield is a full-time student at Mankato State University, Mankato, Minn. She is majoring in criminal justice administration and expects to receive her degree in March.

The 79th will return to Rochester in mid-July, according to Brenna.

(Capt. Kachenmeister is the public affairs officer for the 300th Military Police Command, of which the 79th is a part.)



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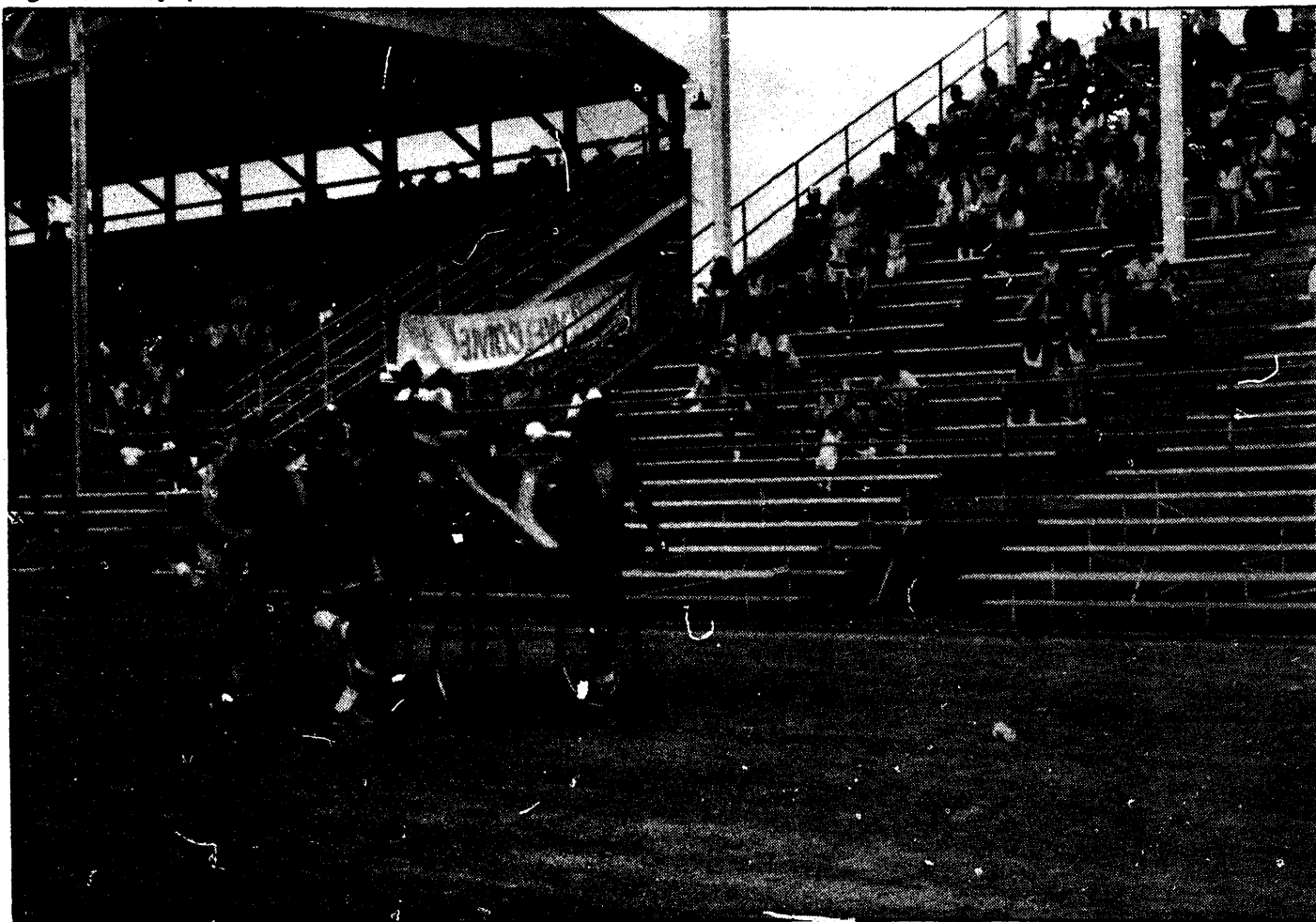
